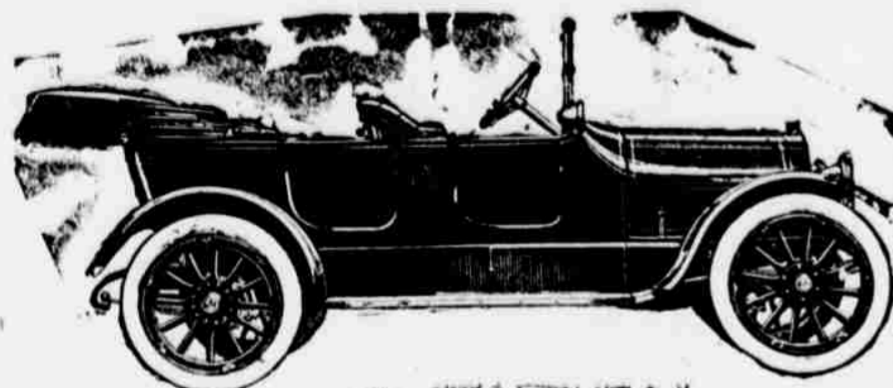

School Board Transacts Considerable Business

Red Cloud, Nebr., May 22, 1915. At a called meeting the Board met at Pope Bros. Hardware Store, for the purpose of electing a sub-primary teacher for the ensuing year. Members present Blackledge, Coon, Gilham and Pope.

Teachers' Committee made a report recommending Miss Alice Marquette, of Gothenburg, who was elected by the entire vote of all members present. Her salary was fixed at \$55 per month, with an additional \$1.25 per year.

Red Cloud, Nebr., May 31, 1915. At a meeting of the Board in special session at L. H. Blackledge's office, with members Blackledge, Coon, Gilham, Cross and Pope present.

R. D. Moritz made brief report. Resignation of John Boehr, teacher of Agriculture, received, read and accepted.

Matter of further repairing of school books turned over to John Wolf.

Almo Clutter left in charge of Agriculture Farm pending appointment of Boehr's successor.

Secretary ordered to correspond with Miss Laura Heartwell, relative to filling vacancy in subprimary department.

Petition of Fred and Carl Hedge, John Yost and Attorney Masner, relative to procuring a separate school in the north part of the district, was read but is to be acted upon at the next meeting.

Ordered that old court house be torn down and wrecked.

Joe Barta was elected janitor of the Lincoln school at a salary of \$60 per month.

Agricultural students are to be given an additional credit for extra work at Agricultural Farm, same to be done under direction of Building and Grounds Committee. Chairman Coon, of this committee was instructed to look after the farm.

President Blackledge ordered contracts to be used in the employment of teachers to be drawn up in form and printed.

Board adjourned to meet at 3 p. m. in the high school building, June 28th. C. J. Pope, Secretary.

Webster County Teachers' Institute, conducted by County Superintendent Gertrude L. Coon, convened Monday, June 7th, with an enrollment of 145.

The instructors are Miss Alice Florer of River Falls, Wisconsin, who is conducting primary and playground work, Dr. Howard Driggs of Salt Lake City, Utah, lecturer on language teaching, Professor J. W. Searson, who teaches advanced reading, civics and current events and school management, Mr. Bert W. Harris instructor in drawing and the Palmer Method writing, and John W. Boehr teacher of agriculture. All of the instructors are giving practical work, and are an inspiration to the county teachers.

The informal reception was held Tuesday evening in the court house. Every teacher present enjoyed the games and refreshments.

E. W. Ross Dies At Eureka, Arkansas

Mr. E. W. Ross who had been a resident of this city for the past twentyfive years, but who with his wife and daughter moved to Eureka, Arkansas last January for the benefit of his health, died at that place Tuesday. He had been ailing for several years. Mr. Ross was engaged in the draying business in this city for many years and also served one year as Mayor. In 1907 Mr. Ross ran for County Clerk on the Republican ticket and was elected. He served three terms in that office performing his work in a faithful manner. His first wife died several years ago after two daughters had been born to this union. A few years ago he married again and his wife and two daughters, Mrs. Arthur Roby and Miss Marie are left to mourn his demise. Mr. Ross was 55 years old. The remains arrived in the city this morning and the funeral services will be held Saturday afternoon.
