Nebraska Farm Values Depend on Small Towns

"As Nebraska land values go higher the farms will become smaller, and alfalfa and the dairy cow will be brought more and more into prominence."

That is a quotation from the last issue of the Independent Farmer, published at Lincoln, Neb. We believe it is right and that leads one to some other considerations.

As land values increase, as farms become smaller and rural population more intense, as farm people become more and more dependent on dairying so will they become more and more dependent on a nearby market and shipping facilities, on social advantages and all other conveniences.

Therefore, as Nebraska land values raise these values will be more and more dependent on the prosperity of small towns. The prosperity of Iowa depends absolutely on the prosperity of her small towns, any way you reason, and Nebraska is fast coming into the same class.

If Nebraska farmers are wishing for the time when their land will be worth more money, when they will have more social and business advantages, the very best way they can bring that about is to encourage the business already established in their nearest towns. Already it is acknowledged that a large factor in determining the value of Nebraska land is its distance from a good live town.—Omaha Trade Exhibit.

Notice of Special Bond Election.

SEWER BOND PROPOSITION.

Notice is hereby given to the electors of the city of Red Cloud, Webster county, Nebraska, pursuant to a resolution adopted by the mayor and council of said city, at a regular adjourned meeting thereof July 7th, 1915, by which resolution the council determined upon a system of sewerage and the estimate of the cost thereof, that a special election is called and will be held in said city, at the usual voting places therein to-wit: In the first ward at the office of the city water and light superintendent and in the second ward at the Fireman's Hall on the 10th day of August, 1915, between the hours of 8 o'clock a. m. and 7 o'clock p. m. at which the following proposition is submitted to be voted upon:

"Shall the Mayor and city council of the city of Red Cloud, Nebraska, be authorized to issue coupon bonds to be denominated Sewer Bonds of said city of Red Cloud, Nebraska, in the amount of fifteen thousand dollars in denominations of five hundred dollars each, payable to bearer, to become due 20 years after the date thereof, but payable any time after the expiration of five years at the option of said city, and bearing not to exceed five per cent annual interest and to be dated the day of their issuance, interest and principal to be payable at the office of the state treasurer of Nebraska. Said bonds to be sold not less than par value with accrued interest and proceeds thereof to be used by said city for the construction and establishing a system of sewerage in and for said city, said system not to include any lateral or district sewer; and shall the mayor and council of said city annually levy the necessary tax upon all the taxable property within said city, in addition to all other taxes, to pay the interest upon said bonds, as the same may become due and to furnish a sinking fund for the payment of the principal of said bonds, and an annual tax of not to exceed two mills on the dollar of assessed valuation of the property of said city for the purpose of maintaining and repairing said system of sewerage."

LEVY ORDINANCE.

An Ordinance providing for the levy of City taxes for the ensuing year.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Red Cloud, Nebraska,

SECTION ONE (1). There is hereby levied on all the taxable property of the City of Red Cloud the following taxes on each One dollar of the Real and personal property in said City for the purposes hereinafter mentioned:

For General Fund..... 10 mills For Interest on Water Works..... 2 mills For Maintenance of Water Works..... 1 mill For Maintenance of Electric Light..... 5 mills For Public Park, Water and Sewer..... 2 mills For Public Health Water Works..... 2 mills

TOTAL..... 22 mills

SECTION TWO (2). This shall take effect immediately after its passage approval and publication.
