This is the latest harvest within the memory of man. Some few weeks may be cut as early as this coming Saturday but harvest will not be in full swing until another week. Last year threshing was well under way at this time. During the past eight weeks we have had heavy rains on an average every two days with cool days and cold nights. Some fields of wheat have been attacked by rust but on the whole this crop is in splendid condition and will yield handsomely.

The Red Cloud Concert Band at Hastings last Monday was greatly appreciated and admired. Not only the people of Hastings but also the many strangers in the city were profuse in their compliments of our band. A petition calling for submitting a proposition for sewer bonds has been presented to the council. We believe that this question was defeated when voted on before because few people understood how extensive the system proposed would be and what it would cost the individual tax-payer. These conditions will no doubt be overcome since the council sees fit to again submit the question to the people.

People all over the Union are very much pleased over the appointment of Mr. Lanning as Secretary of State. As a nation we have been exceptionally fortunate so far in the men who have filled this position but as a matter of fact we have not been worthy of such good fortune owing to the fact that appointments are made to this office for political reasons and not because we have had the foresight to prepare men by years of training for the intricate problems that they are called upon to solve. Lincoln Letter

The Hotel Commission has been busy this week sending out notices to all the hotels in the state calling their attention to the fact that a registration fee of two dollars is due. This notice is sent to all hotels, restaurants, rooming and apartment houses in the state. The Deputy Hotel Commissioner Phil Ackerman issued an order to the Commercial Hotel at Franklin, Nebraska, to either close the place or clean up and has received word that they will re-model the place at big expense. This will be quite a boost to the town. The Commissioner has also sent out fourteen notices this week to different hotels in the state to clean up. The tendency among the hotel men over the state is to comply with the requirements of the law. Quite a noticeable change for the better is being observed. In this work the department has had the co-operation of the traveling men and the hotel committeemen on the U. T. C. Mr. E. E. Abbott of Beatrice has been devoting all his spare time to this work.

In response to a letter from the editors of the International Encyclopedia, State Auditor Smith has written them as follows concerning Nebraska's bank guaranty law and its operations: "In 1909 Nebraska passed a bank guaranty act under the provisions of which all deposits in state banks are protected by a fund raised as a result of an assessment based upon the deposits carried by the banks, this fund containing at this time \$1,920,000. At the time this law went into effect there were 662 state banks in Nebraska and 220 national banks. There are now 772 state banks in operation and 217 national banks. In 1909 the deposits in state banks aggregated \$73,283,225.75 while according to a report submitted to the department at the close of business on April 21, 1915, the deposits were \$103,228,807.11.
