Asking For Franchise

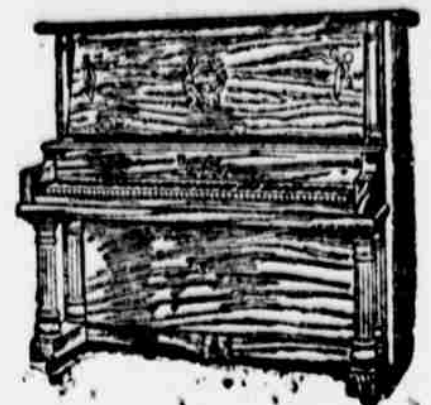
A petition now signed by about 50 taxpayers and free holders residing within the corporate limits of the village of Guide Rock have already signed a petition asking the village board to grant a franchise to G. C. Bailey who desires to install an electric light plant in Guide Rock. Many more will sign the petition as only three or four persons have refused. There are about 140 voters in the village. It is said that Mr. Bailey has plenty of financial backing and is willing to bound himself to produce satisfactory results at a scale of prices set by city ordinance, or turn his franchise back to the town. When he does this the question of whether he is an experienced electrician is immaterial, for he will have to do satisfactory work himself or get some one else to do it who will be satisfactory. The most of our people have been waiting for years for a lighting plant while smaller and less prosperous communities have enjoyed them. We certainly hope this opportunity will not be allowed to slip out of our grasp. Many of our leading citizens now confidently hope to see a substantial plant in operation by the first of the year.—Guide Rock Signal.
