Ventilation was not thought of when this building was erected and with the present crowded condition this is a serious affair.

No teacher can do the best of work without blackboards and pure air. No pupil can make the best advancement where the surroundings are detrimental to health and activity. This district has always maintained a high standard not because some other city is setting the pace but simply because we believe in giving our children a good education. It matters not what others are this week. doing. It would seem from the above that a new building is really a great necessity.
