Nebraska Gets Publicity

Nebraska and Omaha are getting a wonderful amount of publicity, because of the travel to the expositions. Figures compiled in San Francisco show that more than sixty per cent of the transcontinental travel is going through Nebraska and Omaha, either on the outgoing journey or on the return trip. Many of the tourists, especially those from the eastern states, make their trip through Nebraska in the day time, arriving in Omaha in the evening.

The invitation to stop in Nebraska and Omaha stares every traveler in the face in San Francisco. In every visiting office, and all tickets have to be validated, this invitation is on every counter, large billboards covering the counters. In addition, tickets are placed in envelopes which carry the same invitation.

Nothing but words of commendation are heard for Nebraska on every side. The trip through the state leaves a very desirable impression on the traveler. They have learned that Nebraska is the greatest agricultural state in the union and with the hundreds of miles of land growing under the production, an object lesson has been given which will never be forgotten.

Regarding Farm Receipts

The total receipts for 1911 on farms typical of a large part of eastern Nebraska averaged \$2,550 per farm. Of this total, \$874 came from the natural yearly increase in live stock, feed and crops held for sale at the close of the year. The increase in the value of young stock constitutes about half of the annual receipts from this source. The fact that the cash receipts are often small discourages most of those who do not figure closely on their farm business. One farmer decided he was not making anything so he sold out. The returns showed that he was getting ahead faster than he expected. Before he had time to move to town he was back to farming. This is an expensive way of taking an inventory. Total receipts are easily determined when farmers keep an annual inventory and a record of farm sales. In connection with the Farm Management Survey Work, the Extension service will have inventory blanks and farm record books available for distribution in time to cover next year's business. These blanks are being prepared in harmony with the ideas of Nebraska farmers who have met with the greatest success in keeping practical farm records.

"Hogging Down" Corn

Unless Nebraska has an unusually favorable fall this year, there will be a hogging down of corn in many localities when the price falls below \$1.00 per bushel. Such corn is often sold at a loss and very little profit is realized. Hearing these facts the Animal Husbandry Department of the College of Agriculture should be consulted. The department should be consulted for the best method of handling corn. By selling corn only when the price is above \$1.00 per bushel, the farmer can get more for his corn. The department of agriculture should be consulted for the best method of handling corn.

Corn and Wheat Bulletin

Owing to the generally backward state of this year's corn crop in many of the northern but important growing sections of the belt, there is danger of injury to the crop by killing frost. The consequence of which may be expected at any time. It is therefore important that every effort possible be made to secure good seed for next year's crop. Where any last year's corn is left it should be gone over and the best ears saved for seed; moreover, as corn matures unevenly, it is possible to secure seed from the early ears before the rest of the crop is matured.

Suggestions On Seed

Because of unusual conditions this year, many farmers will find it desirable to practice early field selection of seed corn.

Seed corn may be safely selected in the stiff dough stage, if properly cured. The vitality of corn selected earlier than this is likely to be impaired.

Early picked seed corn must be dried rapidly at the earliest possible moment. If left lying in a pile for as much as a few hours the growth of mold is likely to start.

In drying immature corn, it is important to keep the ears from close contact.

While drying, rain-proof buildings which provide a free circulation of air and a non-culture above freezing are highly desirable.

Well-preserved seed corn a year old is very satisfactory.—Department of Experimental Agronomy, College of Agriculture.
