The following standards, established by the Playground and Recreation Association of America, have been adopted for the schools of Webster County. The completion of each test entitles the boy to a badge. These tests are for boys. The Association is planning a series of tests for girls which will be published later.

**First Test—**

Pull up 4 times

Standing Broad Jump 5ft. in.

60 Yard Dash 8:35 sec.

**Second Test—**

Pull up 6 times

Standing Broad Jump 6 ft. 6 in.

60 Yard Dash 8 sec.

Or 100 Yard Dash 14 sec.

**Third Test—**

Pull up 9 times

Running High Jump 4 ft. 4 in.

200 Yard Run 28 sec.

Boys of twelve years of age should be able to qualify for the badge of the first test. Boys of thirteen years or over should be able to pass the second test. High school boys should meet the third test.

The aim of the tests is to encourage every child to take some exercises that will build up his body each day, and they are prompted by the belief that:

1. Every boy ought to be physically efficient.

2. Every boy ought to try to reach a minimum physical standard.

3. The boy who makes himself physically efficient is preparing himself for citizenship later.

Mrs. C. E. Joyce served a dinner Tuesday to her nephews and nieces in honor of her daughter's fifth birthday.

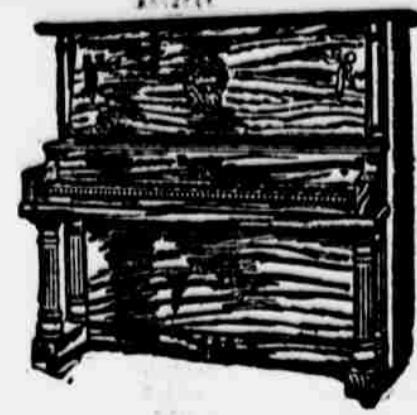
