This year, according to the Dairy Department, University of Nebraska, between six and seven hundred thousand dairy cows are being milked in Nebraska. They are producing about 300,000,000 gallons of milk annually, containing more than 96,000,000 pounds of butter fat—enough to supply one-sixth of all the food eaten by Nebraska's one and one-fourth million people, provide skim milk for the pigs and calves of the state, and furnish a large surplus thru Nebraska creameries. On Wednesday, M. W. Ensign, a representative of the C. B. & Q., met Mayor Damerell and his committee and viewed the land east and west of this city in regard to moving the Burlington depot up to division street. 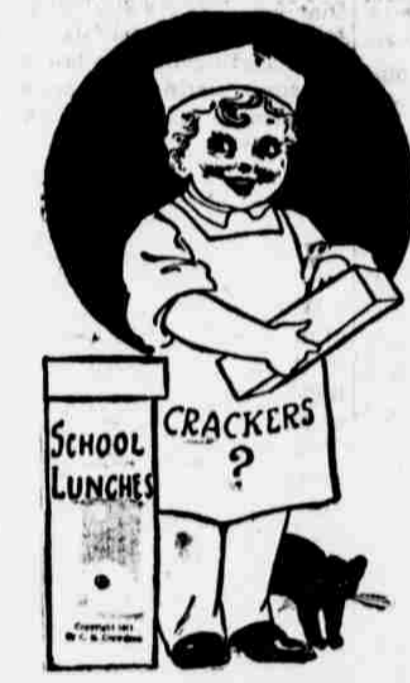
