Red Cloud Team Defeats Superior

The Red Cloud High School football team defeated the Superior team on the local grounds last Friday by a score of 27 to 0, before a large crowd. Superior was not in class with the locals and was penalized many times for roughplay. Superior's halfback Bertram was vanished from the game by Referee Gellatly for rough tactics. The local's goal was never in danger. The playing of Wilson at tackle was a feature, he spoiling many plays for Superior, and also blocking many of their punts. Stellar worked by Kidd, while Baker, Overleese and Pope made many long gains for the locals. The game started with Red Cloud kicking out of bounds and ball was Superior's on their 20-yard line. Superior was thrown back 5 yards and lost the ball on their first down. Red Cloud opened their play with a forward pass from Overleese to Kidd for 15 yards for first touchdown after three minutes of play. Zeiss failed at goal, score 6 to 0.

Red Cloud scored again at opening of second quarter. Superior on 4th down punted 35 yards and Overleese returned 5 yards. The backfield took turns, making 15 yards, and on next down made 6 more. Overleese then passed 20 yards to Reed who scored a touchdown. Zeiss kicked goal, score 13 to 0.

Later in the second quarter a forward pass, Overleese to Baker, added 15 yards and then Overleese on a fake pass went thru the field for 30 yards for Red Cloud's 3rd touchdown. Zeiss kicked goal, score 20 to 0.

In the 3rd quarter Red Cloud added her 4th score. Superior kicked 40 yards. Pope returned 20 yards, the backs hit the line for 12 yards, Pope added 20 yards on an end run, reaching the 20 yard line. After an exchange of punts it was Red Cloud's ball on the 60 yard line. Red Cloud made downs and Superior was penalized 15 yards and Bertram was put out of the game. On next downs backfield gained 16 yards, and on a forward pass of 25 yards, Overleese to Baker, they scored their last touchdown. Zeiss kicked goal, score 27 to 0. Red Cloud carried ball within scoring distance several times but failed at drop kicks. Final score 27 to 0. Referee, Gellatly. Umpire, Stone. Timekeeper, Meyers. Quarters, 15 minutes.
