A MODERN SCHOOL BUILDING.

Two Room Structure for the Deer Creek District.

State Superintendent Thomas has information concerning a practical demonstration of the interest awakened in rural school district No. 10 in Madison county.

At a special meeting, held recently, the district voted a levy of \$5,000 for the purpose of erecting a modern two-room school building.

The architect employed by the board has drawn plans providing two rooms, each 33x33 feet, with twelve-foot ceilings, the rooms separated by folding partition which may be opened to make one large assembly room for community center meetings.

Rural Community Conference.

A conference for rural life workers will be held at the College of Agriculture from June 14 to 23, 1916. It is not the purpose of the conference to provide instruction in technical agriculture, but rather to discuss means and methods for bringing about a better rural community life.

Although Norfolk got a majority of the votes cast in a county seat removal contest, the county seat will remain at Madison for another two years at least, Norfolk polled 2,875 votes, Madison 2,564, giving Norfolk 53 per cent of the total of the 7,459 votes. Sixty per cent was required by law to make the change.

Additional advances in the prices of farm implements have been announced by agricultural machinery houses in this territory.

Considering the poor hay crop and soft corn John Peterson of Stanton county did unusually well with a bunch of cattle he has fed for about five months.

Secretary Corners of the Grand Island Commercial club has received news that Grand Island is to have a new Union Pacific depot at once.

Following a government statement that meat prices are 12.7 per cent higher than the last six-year average, and probably higher than ever before.

The announcement that Hastings soon will start eleven miles of new paving, that four or five new business buildings are to start soon and that contracts already have been left for more than a score of new modern homes, has attracted scores of laborers and mechanics from Nebraska and adjoining states.

The annual convention of the Nebraska Fraternal Order of Eagles is scheduled to take place in Lincoln on June 21, 22 and 23.

Word has been received in Omaha from Savannah, Ga., of the great interest being taken there in the proposed Savannah to Seattle transcontinental highway, which it is proposed to outline and map off at a big meeting to be held in Omaha April 24 to 25.

Gage county's fourth gopher extermination club has been organized at Filley. Thirty-six farmers residing on the various sections of the township were named to have charge of the extermination work.

Twenty-two blocks of the residence portion of Kearney, comprising one paving district, will be paved this spring. This makes approximately forty blocks of paving to be contracted for this spring.

The city of Albion is contemplating the construction of a \$50,000 hotel. A subscription campaign is now on. An Omaha concern offers to loan half the necessary funds.

Officials of the Burlington railroad have promised the city of Scottsbluff a new passenger station to be completed sometime during the next year.

HE HAS HAD GRAND CROPS

And Likes the Laws in Western Canada.

'I lived near Lee, Illinois, for 46 years. I came to Saskatchewan in the spring of 1912 and bought land near Briarcrest. I have farmed this land, 1650 acres, ever since. I have had grand crops. In 1914 I had 100 acres of wheat that yielded 40 bushels to the acre. I sold this wheat at \$1.50 per bushel. I like the country and my neighbors. My taxes on each quarter section (160 acres) are about \$32 a year. This covers municipal tax, school tax, hall insurance tax—everything. There is no war tax so-called. I like the laws in force here. There is no compulsion to me in any way. I am just as independent here as I was in Illinois, and I feel that my family and I are just as well protected by the laws of the province as we were in our old home in Illinois. What I earn here is my own. I have seven children and they take their places at school, in sports and at all public gatherings the same as the Canadian born. (Sgd.) M. P. Tysdal.
