Death Ends Suffering Of Charles Dow Kaley

While it was known to almost every one in the community that the end was near for Charles Dow Kaley, yet a pall of gloom seemed to settle over the city on Tuesday morning when it became known he had surrendered his soul to his Maker after making a hard fight for life for the past three weeks. Charles Dow Kaley was the oldest one of the two boys of Mr. and Mrs. A. F. Kaley. He was born at North Baltimore, Ohio, and was 20 years, 10 months and 9 days of age, most of which time having been spent in this city. Health did not permit the young man to finish school, he being forced about two years ago to have one of his limbs amputated and this operation apparently did not improve his condition.

Hard, indeed it is hard, to think that one with Dow's ability, one who regardless of his suffering always had a pleasant smile and a friendly greeting for all, one who but to know was to love and one with all of life yet before him—should be taken, yet great is the consolation to be found in the fact that he has bettered his condition and his suffering is over.

Funeral services were held at the home this afternoon at 2:30 conducted by Rev. Beebe.

The lady had been in poor health for some time previous and the immediate cause of her demise was heart failure. She was the wife of Frank B. A Letter From Rev. W. F. Cole

The following letter from Rev. W. F. Cole will prove interesting reading to his many friends in this vicinity:

ALAMOSA, COLO., April 5, 1916.
Dear Friends:

I wish to write to my many friends in Red Cloud thru the columns of your paper.

First I want to thank you for the many visits I have had in the past with the friends thru your paper. We have all enjoyed the weekly visits that it has made ever since we first struck Red Cloud. I am very sorry that I did not get to Red Cloud once more before leaving the state. I had thought I would but I became so much worse that I was afraid to stay any longer.

First I presume that you would like to know just where we are. We are just about in the center of the state east and west and about thirty miles north of the New Mexico line. Then in regard to up in the air, we are up some for we are 7500 feet above sea level. You see we are even a mile above you people. This is strictly an irrigated country. The irrigating is done by wells and a dam in the river above us. There are many large flowing wells.

The main crops here are potatoes, peas, barley, spring wheat and oats. I have a very good church, 130 members, a nice cement block church, with basement and Sunday School rooms.

Thus far our reception has been very cordial and all seem to be doing their best to make us feel at home.

I am feeling very much better tho I am not entirely well. I do not have the asthma here at all but the bronchial tubes are sore yet and I get tired when I preach twice and teach a Sunday School class. I have a fine mens' class. The children are both real well and seem to like it here very much. Mrs. Cole is not feeling very well, she was all tired out before she came and then I guess that the altitude is affecting her a little. I think after she gets rested and a little used to the altitude that she will be all right.

We are praying for Red Cloud these days and are trusting that the Lord will get hold of many of the hearts of men there and lead them to accept Christ as their personal Savior.

County Commissioners Met On Tuesday

RED CLOUD, NEBR., April 11, 1916. Board of County Commissioners met pursuant to adjournment. Members present viz: T. J. Chaplin, Grant Snider, W. G. Hoffman, Floyd McCall and Paul Storey Chairman of said Board.

In the matter of Joseph Sadtiek incompetent whom Guardian Frank P. Sadtiek has entered into a contract with a society known as The Poor Sisters of St. Francis Convent of Lafayette, Indiana, whereby the said Sisters agree to care for said Jos. Sadtiek incompetent so long as he shall live and the said Frank P. Sadtiek as Guardian and Anna Pavelka sister and Christena Sadtiek have agreed to transfer all interest in real and personal property due said Jos. Sadtiek from the estate of his brother Anthony Sadtiek and as provided in section 1676 of 1913 Statutes of Nebraska. The Board approved said contract.

The Board settled with the Road Overseer of district No. 124. Alex Buckles was appointed Road Overseer of district No. 11 and the clerk was directed to forward a bond to him.

As a candidate for the nomination for Clerk of the District Court, on the Democratic and People's Independent ticket, I desire to call attention to a few facts concerning the office. The term of office is four years covering the same period as that of Judges of the District Court.

From January, 1912, to January, 1915, 746 cases were entered on the trial docket, of which only fourteen were criminal cases and some of these having been continued from the previous year. The business of the office in 1915 was nearly double that of 1912.

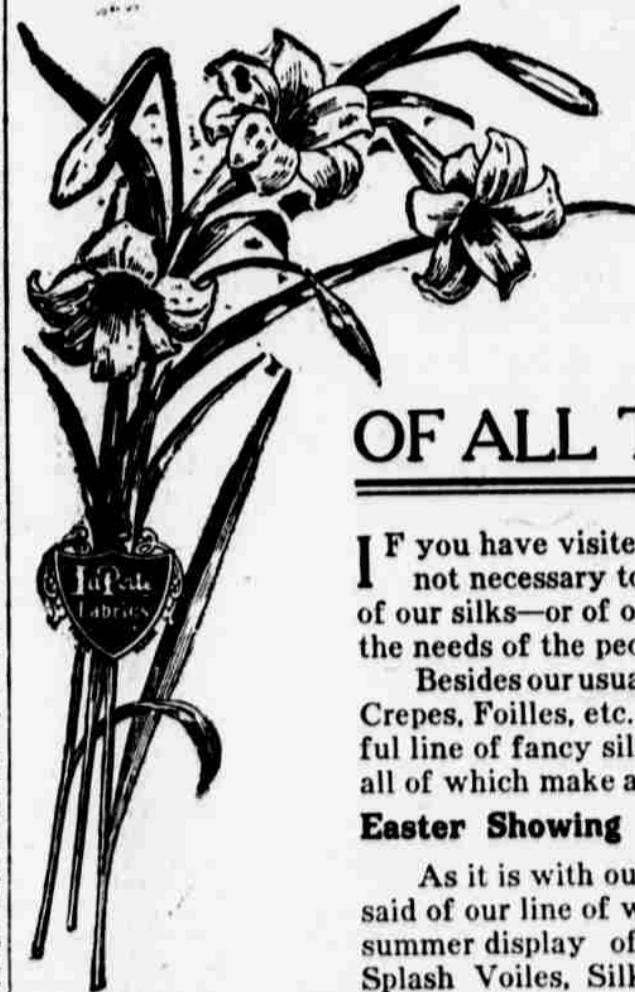
