Board Of Education Transacts Business

Red Cloud, April 12, 1916. Board met pursuant to adjournment with all members present.

Upon motion the City Treasurer was instructed to deliver the High School Bonds to the U. S. Trust Co., they agreeing to pay interest at 5 percent up to the time of withdrawal not later than September 1st, 1916.

The Secretary was instructed to take out a six months certificate of deposit at 4 percent for the \$5000 already delivered.

The resignation of J. J. Wren, teacher of Agriculture, was read and upon motion was declared accepted, to take effect at the end of the school year May 19th.

The teachers' committee reported recommending the re-election of Miss Ducker, teacher of Mathematics and W. P. Medlar, teacher of Science and History. The report was accepted by the Board and Miss Ducker and Mr. Medlar were so declared elected.

The Superintendent made his report, moved and seconded that Geo. Hadell be allowed \$20 as teacher of Manual Training during sickness of J. J. Wren. This being for time already taught and to be taught up to the end of the school year. Carried.

Upon motion all teachers in the Sneak Day Examinations were allowed one extra day's pay and the Secretary was instructed to include this in their monthly warrants.

The Board adjourned until Wednesday, April 19th, at 7:30 p. m., at Commercial Club rooms.

Public School Musicale

The classes in music of the Red Cloud city schools, under the direction of Miss Nina Simmons, will give a musical program at the Orpheum, Friday night, April 21, 1916. An admission of 25c will be charged. Proceeds to be used for the purchase of a Victrola for the school. Program will begin at 8 p. m.

The assessors of 1915, among other items, returned a total for the state of Nebraska of 13,929 stationary engines and boilers; 18,324 gasoline and steam tractor engines; 1,948 threshing machines and steam power shellers; 61,927 cream separators; 1,022 butter making machines, and 3,790 wagon scales on leased land.

After a brief illness, in which the best medical skill of Kansas City proved unavailing to assist the little sufferer in her struggle for life, the sorrowing father and mother brought home her lifeless body, Friday morning.

The funeral was held from the home of the child's grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. I. H. Holmes, Saturday afternoon. The two ministers, Revs. Myers and Beebe conducted the services. The rooms were filled with flowers, the beautiful tokens of the sympathy of friends of the parents. Four young ladies the Misses Gertrude Adams, Greta Tarnure, Edith Hoffman and Alison Cowden bore the little casket to and from the hearse.

There was no child of her age so well known in the city as was Rachel. She was so active, happy, bright, amiable and intelligent, that she was a joy, not to her family alone, but to every one in her neighborhood and to all who met her upon the streets. She was the innocent expression of Life and Love, glad of the affection lavished upon her, and gladdening all about her with its reflection.

Our words are vain to comfort those whose home has been made vacant. But when the keenness of their grief shall be softened by time, the hearts of the parents will find some solace in the effort of their hosts of friends to share their sorrow. The loss of a beautiful young life that promised so richly of future benediction, can only be recompensed by the faith that she will still minister to earth, when from "flesh to spirit she has risen, with increase of beauty circling her". Rachel was born September 9th, 1912, and was 3 years 7 months and 4 days of age.

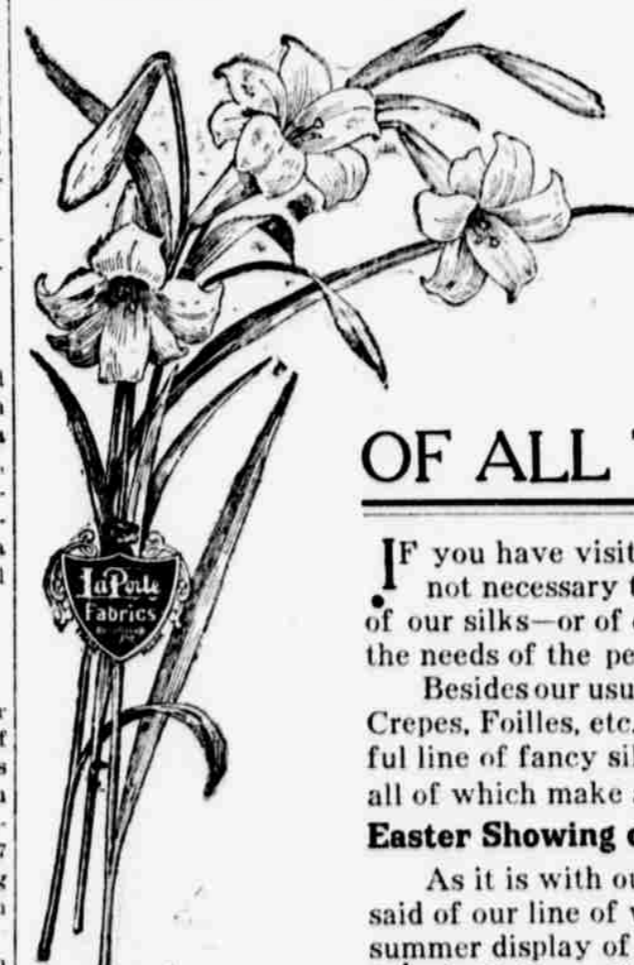
