Mrs. Frank Starr is home from Lebanon, where she had been visiting her parents for the past two months.

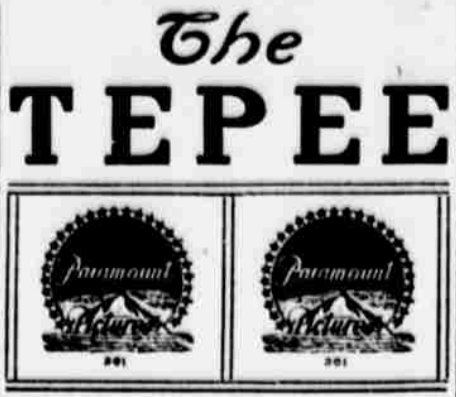
