Breede has "sprung a surprise" on us, as we are not aware of the fact that he was a possessor of such promising musical talent, and there is not a doubt, that if he follows up this line of work, but what he will be as successful in composing music as he is in wielding the pen. Thanks, Bro. Breede, and may success crown your efforts.

The last three sessions of the Nebraska legislature have been under democratic control. During those three sessions more progressive statutes have been put upon the books than had been put upon the books by any six or eight sessions of the legislature controlled by republicans. Democracy gave Nebraska the bank guarantee law, the initiative and referendum, the board of control and consolidated departments to great financial advantage. It enacted more progressive labor legislation than had ever before put upon the statute books, giving the wage earners of Nebraska the factory inspection law, the safety appliance law and the compensation law. The only progressive liquor legislation enacted in thirty years was enacted by a democratic legislature and signed by a democratic governor. The progressive voters of Nebraska—in the majority for several years—will endorse this progressive record by electing Keith Neville and the whole democratic state ticket, and re-electing Senator Gilbert M. Hitchcock.

Democratic Convention

In accordance with the request of the state committee a delegate county convention of the Democrats of Webster county is hereby called to meet in Red Cloud, July 22nd, at 2 o'clock, in the court house, for the purpose of electing 12 delegates to the state convention, also to elect a county central committee and to transact such other business as may come before the convention.
