The Rural Credits Law

When the remarkable record of legislative achievement of the Wilson administration is reviewed the rural credits law will rank first in the minds of many and among the greatest in the opinion of all. It is of more value to the farming population of the country, the basic element of the nation, than all the legislation in their behalf passed by the Republicans in the last half century.

The farmer can give the best security in the world. It cannot be lost, hidden or destroyed, or permanently injured. Bad management may cause manufacturing, mercantile, railroad or other stock to drop from \$200 a share to far below par. There are no such fluctuations in land values; they are stable and enduring. Farm loans suffer under one disadvantage—they are not liquid, not immediately or readily convertible into cash.

The trouble has always been that our laws and our banking rules and regulations have been adapted only to the needs of the capitalists, merchants and business generally which only require short time loans, but have not been adapted to the borrowing needs of the farmers. But the evil is now cured and the lack provided for by the rural credits law.

Fortunate this government which, in peace, with malice towards none, without envy, without any desire in the direction of aggression, looks across the wide ocean upon a shattered continent and only figures how it can best contribute after the war is ended in sympathy, in deeds, towards the healing of wounds, the building up of the spirits of those people and strengthening their faith in the effort to overcome the disasters which have befallen them. And in this work one people will know no German, no Frenchman, no Italian, no Russian, no Briton in hostility, but all as fellow human beings in misfortune.

J. K. Coddington, warden of the Kansas penitentiary, lays the blame on "The Little Alley Joins" that exist all over Kansas, where, he says, men and boys congregate night after night to play poker, shoot craps, and indulge in debauchery.

Judge Roy T. Osborne, of Independence, Kansas

On page 13 of the same report, says:
"In the little more than ten years the juvenile court has been established in Kansas, children under sixteen years of age, in this state, have committed practically every crime in the calendar, including murder in the first degree. * * * It is astounding to observe the absolute indifference of many parents to the moral welfare of their offspring. * * * In nearly every community there are places and forms of amusement unwholesome for children." * * *

M. G. McKenzie, Chaplain of the Reformatory in Kansas

Says on page 59 of the First Biennial Report, Kansas State Board of Corrections:
"Of these boys, 202 acknowledged they drank more or less; 275 used tobacco, 77 gambled. Most of these boys ran around considerable, and were away from home, when they got into trouble; 265 were from homes broken by death or divorce." * * *

THE ALLEY JOINT in Kansas is the corrupting influence that lands so many Kansas boys in the Reformatory and Industrial School.
