Former Citizen Passed Away In Washington

The following was taken from the Seattle, Washington, Post-Intelligencer of August 28th, regarding the death of Edward W. Ferris, of Mount Vernon, a brother of Miss Mollie Ferris of this city, who moved from this city about twenty six years ago to that place.

Edward W. Ferris, postmaster of Mount Vernon, and pioneer of Skagit county, died of pneumonia at his home here early today after an illness of ten days. He was 49 years old. He is survived by a wife and two children. Funeral services, in charge of the Masonic Lodge, will be held at the family home Sunday afternoon.

Mineral Point, Wis., was Mr. Ferris' birthplace. He came West to Mount Vernon in 1893, engaging first in the lumber business. For twenty years he served as court stenographer here, said to be a record for the state of Washington.

He was active in civil affairs, serving as president of the Mount Vernon Commercial Club and as mayor of the city. He resigned the latter position in June, 1913, to accept from Gov. Lister the appointment of state forester and fire warden, and while engaged in this work became known all over the state. On April 1, of this year, he was appointed postmaster of here.

Mr. Ferris was prominently identified with nearly every movement for the development of Mount Vernon and the surrounding territory. He was best known in a political way and considered one of the most prominent Democrats in Northwestern Washington.

On Tuesday evening, the executive board of the Chamber of Commerce held a meeting and endorsed the proposition of calling a special election to vote \$20,000 for the proposed sewerage system. They also made elaborate plans to entertain the Republican Valley Editorial Association which will be held here in October also talked a little about the road question, after which they allowed a few claims.

Mrs. Verinda Lutz, aged 77 years passed away at the home of her son, Ross Fearh, in Walnut Creek precinct, Saturday, after an illness of a few days duration. She was an old settler and was well and favorably known. Several children and relatives are left to mourn her demise. The funeral services were held Monday morning at the home. Rev. Points officiating, after which interment was made in the Red Cloud cemetery.

Thou shalt harvest and properly store thy seed corn before freezing weather.


Thou shalt improve thy seed corn by selecting the 100 best ears.
