Tas Whitehead-Overing debate on the Wilson Mexican Policy was a great success and the people were delighted with the discussion. Whitehead made an able defense of Wilson's policy while Overing having the weaker side of the case, made good use of the material at hand The debate revealed the following facts:

1. That the vicious government is the chief cause of the weakness of

That seventy-five percent of the Mexican industries are owned American and foreign capitalists.

 That these capitalists desire armed intervention and prevent the common people of Mexico of coming into possession of their own country That armed intervention would be a crime against the 15,000,000 peo ple of Mexico, the producers and toil-

ers of the sister republic. That Huerta and other bandit movements represent the special in-terests in their effort to steal Mexican soil from the common people

That President Wilson has by his policy of moral intervention assisted the people of Mexico in ridding themselves of Huerta—the tool of Wall street interests.

That Wilson has gained the confidence of South American republics which Taft and Roosevelt destroyed. That Mexico has been assured of the right to settle her own domestic

9. That the special interests of the United States can not drag the young men into Mexico to become targets for the protection of stolen property. That America is ready to aid the sister republic in her struggle for justice but will never tax her own citizens to protect American gamblers on Mexican soil.

Passed Away at Lincoln

Mr. W. G. Hoffman, a well known citizen of Batin township, passed away at St. Elizabeth's hospital, in Lincoln, Tuesday morning. He had been in poor health for the past year and several weeks ago went to Lincoln for treatment. On Monday he was operated on for cancer of the liver, but owing to his weakened condition death followed. The deceased was about 48 years of age and was born in Dwight, Illinois. To this union were born two boys and five girls, who with their mother survive him At the time of his death he was county commissioner of the second district, and in this capacity had served the people faithfully.
