### Best of Its Kind in the State

Within the bounds of Webster county there has been for the pleasure of our citizens, every known means of entertainment, from a county fair to a circus, but the headliner of them all was the Farmers' Institute held here last week.

Speaking of attendance, well they were here from every nook and corner of the county and many from Kansas also. To stand and gaze down old Webster street, one would think they were in a city many times the size of Red Cloud. They came via of steam, gasoline, horse and even mule power. It is putting it mildly when we say it was largest crowd ever in the city. The exhibits in the live stock, farm produce, school and ladies' departments were so far superior to those of former years and the large number of entries evidenced the interest shown by every one, even the children.

The crowning feature of the event was the big parade on Friday. The officers of the association, drawn by a pair of prancing black horses, were in the lead, followed by Prof. LoRoy and his aggregation of able musicians. Then came the school children, attired in the garb of Webster county's first inhabitants, the Indians, the Puritans, Daniel Boone and his followers; those who faced hardships and even death to place the flag of the nation in this locality, the pioneers, the tillers of the soil, the housewife, the business man, future voters and athletes and the first dairy. The floats representing the Goddess of Liberty, and the states of the Union were exceptionally well displayed, in fact, the promoters and all those who assisted in perfecting the arrangements as well as all those who took part in the this parade, are deserving of much credit.

The stock included in this parade was also worthy of note, as it gave evidence to the fact that our country ranks among the first in the raising of stock.
