

## Corn Show Jan. 15 to 20

A corn show is to one of the big features of Organized Agriculture Week at the University Farm, Lincoln, Jan 15 to 20, when twenty-eight agricultural societies meet simultaneously for annual sessions. The corn-show is to be held in connection with the apple. flower and potato show, both occupying the city auditorium. The home economics association is [arranging to have an exhibit at the university farm campus.

Special attention is to be paid to Nebraska youngsters who are growing corn. Separate classes will be provided for boys who have grown their corn without help from adults, and for boys who personally and independently select the ears they wish to enter from corn grown on land operated by a relative, entries limited to boys from 10 to 18 years of age inclusive.
