Kansas City Market

Kansas City Stock Yards, Dec. 4—Killing cattle sold pretty well last week, killers filling good orders from day to day. All quarantine restrictions on the movement of cattle here were removed Saturday. Receipts were 12000 cattle, steers steady, cows strong, stockers and feeders quiet. The hog supply was 10000, market 10 to 15 higher, top \$10, sheep 10 higher, lambs, \$12.55.

BEEF CATTLE
Branded yearlings brought \$10.85 and some pretty good heavy steers sold at \$10.90, strictly prime steers worth up to \$12. The \$10.90 steers today were mates of steers from same shipper at \$10.90 last Saturday. Medium to plain short fed steers sold at \$8.50 to \$10.50, some Missouri steers at \$10.50, 1400 lbs. average, that cost \$7.50 here in September. A train of 23 cars of cattle from Red Rock, Montana, arrived containing ten cars of steers around 1200 lbs at \$7.85, and 13 cars of cows of which 1 car brought \$7.25, 1 car \$7, the main drove \$6.65, balance \$6 to \$6.40, a few throwouts \$5.25. The cow market was a shade higher, including caners, the latter at 4.50 to \$5.

STOCKERS AND FEEDERS
On the discovery of the harmless nature of the disease affecting the sick cattle here all embargoes have been lifted, and trade is on a normal basis. Receipts of stockers and feeders were light, and the feeling was weak, prices quotable at \$5.50 to \$7.50 for steers, and \$5 to \$7 for stock cows and heifers.

HOGS
The morning estimate of 8000 head was raised to 10,000 and there was a very active market at 10 to 15 higher prices, the close 20 higher in some cases. The top was \$10, bulk of sales \$9.40 to \$9.80, medium weights up to \$9.90, light hogs \$9.75. The market showed the good effect of the order buying trade, which was operating today, top here being 10 cents above nearest Missouri River market, and only 10 cents under Chicago top today, bulk of sales here today actually above bulk in Chicago. Killers have a place for hogs in practically unlimited numbers, and present price adjustment is making them good money.

SHEEP AND LAMBS
The market was stronger, and there were several important features. Four cars of pen fed lambs from the Monte Vista district sold at the top price, \$12.35, 72 lbs. average. Four cars of feeding lambs from Roswell, New Mexico sold at \$11, a new high figure for that class, 65 lbs. A car load of prime Kansas fed Nevada wethers and yearlings, 110 lbs., sold at \$9.75—an offer of \$10.25 for the yearlings and \$8.50 for the wethers in this lot being refused. The wethers cost \$4.50 and the yearlings \$7.00 here in Aug. Fat ewes sell at \$7.25 to \$8.25.

Those who fail to prepare for the comfort of poultry now will be compelled to work at it during the icy northern blasts of the winter, so why not now?

Many of the green things of the summer garden may be had for little cost even in the winter if one takes a little care for a hotbed. says the horticultural department of the University of Nebraska. Hotbeds at the university farm are doing fine, and it is expected that there will plenty of lettuce to offer for the Christmas trade. While the growing things in cold frames were killed during the recent zero weather, everything in the hotbeds came thru in good condition.
