The following was taken from a 1916 issue of a Seward paper under the caption of "University Week a Grand Success":

"The state university attractions, which have been with us the past week at the Y. M. C. A. have proven very popular and are considered much stronger than those of last year. The entertainments are varied and five in number and are sent out with the idea of bringing the life and activities of the university in closer touch with the people of the communities where the attractions appear. Only five other towns than Seward secure the entertainments and they were brought here under the auspices of the University club of this county.

Seward people have been very kind and generous in entertaining the students who make up the companies and there have been many more homes open than the requirements called for.

"On Friday evening the Cadet band under direction of Prof. C. H. Cornell opened the week's attractions. There are about 60 musicians in the organization and their music is very good. One of the number, LeRoy Meisinger, is an accomplished pianist and is the composer of the selection, "Knight of the Nymphs," played by the band.

"On Saturday evening the inclement weather kept many from hearing the debate between two debating teams of the university. The subject of discussion was "Resolved, That the United States Should Immediately and Substantially Increase Its Armament (Armament Being Taken to Mean Both Forces and Equipment)." The debate was very good and was won by the affirmative.

The University Players held the boards on Monday evening, presenting a very clever comedy in four acts, "Believe Me, Xaetippe."
