### Young Man Accidentally Killed

One of the saddest deaths that has ever occurred in our city was that of Tartus L. Sherman, which occurred on last Saturday afternoon.

The young man was employed by the Elkhorn Construction Co., which has the contract for the construction of the sewer throughout the city.

His duty was that of placing the plank and jacks that are used to prevent the walls of the ditch caving in and was performing this task when the east bank began to cave. A fellow workman shouted a warning to him and ran south, Tart following him, but before he had reached a point of safety the slide overtook him. Fellow workmen rushed to his assistance, but owing to the danger of additional slides and fear of injuring him, the work of extracting him was slow. About a quarter of an hour time elapsed before the men could uncover his head and a portion of his body and it was then found that he had already expired.

The deceased was born in Davis county, Missouri, October 29, 1892 and was aged 24 years, 6 months and 8 days. He came to this city, with his parents, in 1906, where he has since resided. His industrious upright and happy disposition won for him the respect and admiration of all with whom he came in contact, and his untimely passing has cast a shadow over the hearts of his relatives and friends.

He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. M. Sherman and three brothers, Ralph, Bert and Alva, to whom the sympathy of the entire community is extended.

Funeral services were conducted from the Methodist church, on Monday afternoon at 2:30, Rev. Beebe, assisted by Rev. Drullner, in charge. The employees of the Construction Company attended in a body and business houses closed during the funeral hour.

### F. E. Payne Dies Suddenly

On Wednesday afternoon, while plowing on his farm, Mr. F. E. Payne, one of the most highly respected citizens of Catherton township, dropped dead.

The deceased was born in Frederick county, Virginia, September 23, 1850 and was aged 66 years 8 months and 16 days.

He received a common school education in his native state, and at the age of twenty two years he began life for himself as a farmer, following that occupation with success in Virginia until 1877, when he came to Nebraska, homesteading on 320 acres in Catherton township, where he continued to reside until the time of his death.

He took an active part in local and state politics, and in 1914 was chairman of the Democratic County Central Committee.

Mr. Payne was always ready and willing to take an interest in all matters pertaining to the welfare and advancement of the state, county and community, and during the past winter had devoted much time to the Federal Road Act.

He was a man possessing all the qualities of a gentleman, kind and loving father, and husband, a good neighbor and an upright christian man, having been a member of the Baptist church for many years.

In July, 1881 he was united in marriage to Mrs. Vernie Clutter, to this union was born one daughter, Wilcilla, now Mrs. C. M. Wilson. Mrs. Payne preceded him to the great beyond in the year of 1885.

He is survived by one daughter, four grand children, one brother and three sisters.

At the time of going to press arrangements had not been made for the funeral services.

### Will Celebrate July Fourth

On Tuesday evening an open meeting of the Chamber of Commerce was held at which time several important matters were brought before this body of gentlemen and were freely discussed by those present. Owing to the fact that the members of the W. R. C. and G. A. R. were getting scarce and aged they requested that this body appoint a committee to arrange for a suitable Decoration Day program. The following were appointed to act: Dr. Cross, chairman; E. S. Garber, J. C. Mitchell, P. A. Wallbraund and Rev. Drullner. These gentlemen will work in conjunction with the W. R. C. and G. A. R. members in arranging a program.

The next matter brought before the organization was the celebrating of the nation's greatest day, July 4th. Considerable discussion followed with the result that it was decided to have a patriotic celebration in this city on that day. President F. E. Maurer, Secretary F. W. Cowden and Mayor Damerell were appointed to select a committee and take charge of all details relative to the celebration.

D. F. Kaley and Dr. Damerell were appointed to confer with the old Civil war veterans pertaining to the purchase of a flag and flag staff which is to be placed where the fountain, which was donated by the W. C. T. U., now stands.

The matter of holding a patriotic meeting in the near future, for the purpose of arousing the patriotism of the citizens of this community, was then discussed. W. D. Edson, John Christian and Father Fitzgerald were appointed as a committee to further this movement.

This being all the important matters requiring immediate attention the meeting adjourned.
