After listening to report by the Superintendent the Board proceeded to the election of teachers to fill vacancies. Miss Fay Teel was elected teacher in the high school at a salary of \$67.50 per month; Miss Hollister, teacher of Domestic Science, at salary of \$70 per month. The election of the balance of teachers was put off until the next meeting.
