Only two hundred forty three children have applied for free high school tuition this year. This is fifty five less than applied for tuition last year. All previous years have shown an increase over the preceding year. The decrease shown this year would indicate that a number have neglected to make application. The decrease seems to be largely among children already in high school. The tuition for the coming year is \$1.50 per week or \$54 per year.
