Meeting of School Board

Red Cloud, June 11, 1917. Board met pursuant to adjournment on June 4th. All members present. Minutes of previous meeting read and approved.

On motion, Miss Simmons was re-elected teacher of Music at a salary of \$5 per month. Motion made and carried that the teacher's committee in conjunction with Supt. Whitehead, be authorized to fill all vacancies both in the high school and grades.

The alfalfa crop on the Agricultural farm was let to the highest bidder E. R. Slawson, for \$25.

The Secretary was instructed to draw warrant for \$4000 in favor of J. W. Schlesinger as part payment on contract price of new school building; also to receive bids for three car-loads of Maitland coal (approximately 120 tons) to be delivered at the Lincoln and Washington schools.

Motion made by Weesner and seconded by Herrick that Sanford Fox be re-elected Janitor of the Lincoln school at a salary of \$55 per month for the school year only. Motion carried.

On motion the Board agreed to allow the Chautauqua Association the use of the Lincoln school grounds for \$25.

Upon report of Supt. Whitehead reporting a balance of \$27.30 due the School District from proceeds of the graduation exercises, this amount was ordered transferred to the High School Victrola fund.

Motion made and carried that all tuition fees for the coming year must be paid in advance except where outside school districts were responsible for such fees. On motion the Superintendent was instructed to require a deposit fee equivalent to the price of books, for all books taken out of the school library.

The Secretary was instructed by the Board to collect delinquent tuition fees of \$40.50 from J. S. Maxon of Franklin county and authorized him to make such expense as he deemed necessary in making such collection.

After allowing a number of claims the board adjourned to meet the first Monday in July.

2000 Will Teach Canning

About 2,000 Nebraska folks have enrolled in canning schools to be conducted by the Agricultural Extension Service of the University of Nebraska in 32 towns and cities of the State during the month of June. Every person enrolled has pledged himself to teach others how to can.

However, tho these volunteers will be utilized to teach canning locally this summer, the University will continue canning instruction thruout the season. Beginning the first of July, canning demonstrators from the University will be sent out on "runs" over all parts of the State, each expert being routed to give demonstrations at a series of points. Towns may send requests for such demonstrations to the Extension Service, University Farm, Lincoln, before June 22. Applications should specify the number of days demonstrations are desired and the probable number of persons to be reached.
