Young Men Drawn for Selective Draft Army
The following are the first 162 numbers drawn for Webster county, the county registration numbers and the names of our citizens who were drawn on Friday at the great lottery held in Washington to fix the order of liability for military service of each of the ten million registered men in the United States. The first call is for 1,370,000 men to appear before the local exemption boards. The full number to be drawn is 10,500, which takes in the highest number in any one district, and Webster county, having a credit of forty-three men on enlistments, is only required to furnish sixty-eight by draft. It is estimated that about fifty per cent will be unable to pass the examination, or will be exempted for cause, and until the examination is held it is impossible to state who and how many men beyond No. 68 will be summoned from this county. There are 941 men registered in Webster county, and all will be drawn, and given their numbers in consecutive order, from 1 to 941. Of these, in their new order, there appear the first 162. This list was compiled from the numbers appearing in the state paper and while we are convinced it is correct as taken from them, yet do not guarantee it entirely accurate. As soon as the local board receives official information as regards the numbers and names of those persons to be drafted, they will instruct them by a call which will be published in the local papers, when to appear for examination. From the day the notice that you are one of those called is mailed and posted, you have seven days to file a claim of exemption or discharge. Complete details as regards the draft can be found in bulletins which will be supplied by any member of the local board.
