Kansas City Market

Kansas City Stock Yards, Aug. 13—Cattle received today 18,000 head, market strong to 15 higher on steers, top \$14.15 to 25 higher on cows, stockers and feeders, 25 to 50 higher on calves. Hog supply was 7,000, market 20 to 30 higher, top \$17.35. Sheep and lambs today 4,900, Utah lambs \$15.50

Beef Cattle

Various lots of prime steers sold at \$14 and the right kind would bring \$14.25. Grass steers sold 10 to 15 higher, weighty steers mostly at \$10.50 to \$12.50, tops at \$13.35, for wintered steers. Oklahoma steers sold at \$8.25 to \$11.75, including quarantines weighing 1046 lbs. at \$11. The first train of Western Slope Colorados arrived, 12 cars, from Debeque, Colo., 1127 lbs. average, at \$10.75. Cows were 15 to 25 higher, a car load early to an outside buyer at \$10, not extra fat. Calves made a big advance, top veals \$12.25.

Stockers and Feeders

Stock steers at \$8.50 today were called \$1.50 higher than two weeks ago. A feature sale today was 400 well bred Hereford stock calves from Western Kansas 375 lbs., at \$9.65. Feeding steers weighing 1025 lbs. brought \$11.25. It was a good market on all classes from the country.

Hogs

Hogs are skyrocketing in the last week, and nobody dares say where the advance will stop. A week ago the limit was put at \$17 now people are talking \$20. Heavy hogs brought \$17.35, medium weight hogs sold up to \$17.25, light hogs \$17.10, pigs \$13 to \$14.50, immune stock hogs at \$15 to \$16. Apparently nothing is being sacrificed, and demand for immune stock hogs at the plants around the Stock Yards is very good, market up to 50 cents from Friday. Recent rains are making some hopeless looking corn fields look much better, and if frost holds off the crop will be much larger than prospects indicated two weeks ago.

Levy Ordinance

An Ordinance providing for the levying of City taxes of the City of Red Cloud, Nebraska, for the Current Municipal year.

Be It ordained by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Red Cloud, Nebraska,

SECTION 1. There is hereby levied on all the taxable property of the City of Red Cloud, Nebraska, the following taxes on each One Dollar of the Assessed Valuation of both Real and Personal property in said city for the purposes hereinafter mentioned.

For General Fund	10 mills
For Interest on Electric Light Bonds	1 mill
For Interest on Water Bonds	2 mills
For Interest on Sewer Bonds	5 mills
For Maintenance of Electric Light Works	5 mills
For Maintenance of Water Works	2 mills
For Maintenance of Sewer System	2 mills
For Maintenance of Public Library	2 mills
For Maintenance of Streets, Cross Walks and Water Ways	5 mills
Total	34 mills

SECTION 2. This Ordinance shall be in force and take effect upon its passage, approval and publication.

Articles of Incorporation

Whereas, the undersigned, incorporators, do hereby in pursuance of the Statutes of Nebraska, in such cases made and provided, associate ourselves together as a body politic and corporate in the manner and for the purposes hereinafter mentioned.

Article 1—The said corporation shall be named and known as *Riverton-Invale Light and Power Company*.

Article 2—That its principle place of business shall be the City of Red Cloud, Webster County, Nebraska.

Article 3—The general nature of the business which may be transacted by said corporation shall be as follows:

To acquire land and construct, maintain and operate the public highway in said county or counties, to purchase electric current, and to sell said electric current to any person or corporation along the line of said transmission lines; to issue stock, bonds, or a mortgage or other legal evidences of indebtedness, and to do such other things as are necessary in the transaction of the business above defined.

Article 4—The amount of authorized capital stock of said corporation shall be Ten Thousand Dollars, (\$10,000.00). The amount of bonds said Company may issue shall not exceed Ten Thousand Dollars, (\$10,000.00).

Article 5—The existence of said corporation shall commence when said articles of incorporation are filed with the Secretary of State and county Clerk of said County, and are published according to law, and shall continue for forty (40) years unless sooner terminated by due process of law.

Article 6—The greatest amount of liability to which said corporation may at any one time be subject shall not exceed two-thirds of the capital stock of said Company.

Article 7—The capital stock of said Company shall be divided into 400 shares of Twenty Five Dollars (\$25.00) each.

Article 8—The affairs of said corporation shall be conducted by the Board of five directors, who shall hold such positions for a period of one year from the completion of the said organization of said incorporation, and annually thereafter said Board of directors shall be elected by the stockholders from among their number as shall be approved by the by-laws of said corporation, hereafter to be adopted by said Board of Directors. The Board of directors shall choose a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, and said Secretary and Treasurer shall perform all of the duties required in establishing and conducting the business affairs of said Company and as provided by the by-laws of the corporation. Said officers shall each hold his official position for a period of one year unless removed by said Board of Directors or otherwise.

Article 9—The place of meeting of the said Board of Directors shall be at Red Cloud, Webster County, Nebraska, unless otherwise ordered by the Board of Directors holding said offices from year to year. The said directors shall as soon as convenient after the formation of said incorporation elect said officers at a meeting to be held in Red Cloud, Nebraska, and provide for the opening of stock subscription books and for the transaction of the business affairs of said corporation, provide the necessary seal and record book, which shall be in the form to be determined by the said directors. Vacancies in the Board of directors during the first year of the corporate existence shall be filled by the then holding directors, and thereafter vacancies shall be filled by the said stock holders in the manner provided by law and the by-laws of this corporation.

Article 10—These articles of Incorporation may be amended at any time. Every amendment thereto shall first be approved by a majority of the holding Board of Directors, and upon being approved it shall be entered at large upon the records of the Board, to be accurately kept by the Secretary. Each of such amendments shall be made a part of the articles of incorporation and shall be acknowledged as the record, and public and recorded in the same manner as these articles.
