
top \$18 80, 30 cents above top reported from Chicago. Sheep and lambs to day 5,000, market steady, lambs to killers \$16.50. Beef Cattle

Choice natives sold steady, top \$15, weighty grass cattle 10 to 20 higher, with a good demand for fleshy feeders. who outbid packers on several lots and got them at \$12.85 to \$13.25, packers paying up to \$13.20 for others. Light weight grass cattle sold 15 to 25 higher, medium weight Kansas and Oklahoma steers at \$9 to \$10.50, light Oklahoma steers at \$6.75 to \$8.75, some at the latter price considered 25 higher. Cows and heifers remained dull till the close last week, but are selling better today, at \$6.50 to \$10 for cows, choice fed heifers quotable up to \$13, veal calves \$12.50. Kansas and Oklahoma owners are holding cattle back, as grass is as good now as it ordinarily is in May.

Stockers and Feeders Buyers were in larger attendance ast week, and cleared up the yards close. Good fall pastures are stimulating trade in stock cattle, and good corn prospects are inducing the purchase of feeding steers. Stock steers sell mainly at \$7.25 to \$8.50, feeding steers \$8 to \$10, fleshy feeders upwards to \$13.25 today, stock cows and heifers \$6.25 to \$8.

Hogs

The top price today. \$17.80, was paid for hogs weighing 240 lbs., other medium weight hogs at \$17,75, and choice heavy hogs worth as much, though none were here today. Best lights sold at \$17.25, and bulk of sales was at \$16.50 to \$17.50. Receipts are so light that very little attention is paid to outside markets, top here reabove top in Chicago, including today, and far above other river markets. Tho hog market is in an uncertain position, and buyers at shipping points are having to do some tall guessing to come out even. However, most of the foam was removed last week, and more stable markets are looked for this week, with strength dominating the situation.
