### Nubbins of Truth on Seed Corn Selection.

If you have ever been caught in the spring without a supply of corn that was fit for seed, do not be caught that way again. The best insurance time this fall when the best quality is most plentiful. Pick the seed by hand in the field, says the U. S. Department of Agriculture, from the most productive stalks.

An ear on the stalk is worth a dozen from the bin, when it comes to selecting seed corn. On a productive stalk you know its parentage; from the bin it may look good but be a worthless mongrel as far as seed value is concerned.

### Care of Pullets.

As pullets supply most of the winter eggs, it is necessary to handle them with care when they start to lay, is the word that comes from the poultry department of the University. Pullets of the heavier breeds that were hatched between the first of April and the middle of May are well matured by the first of October and usually start laying between then and the first of November.

This is a critical time for handling such birds. Special care in the preparation of winter quarters will be more than repaid in winter eggs. Sudden changes are to be avoided. Birds housed too closely after being used to free range are likely to molt and stop laying. Keep the house open and try to minimize changes in feeding and housing.

### Thrift Thought.

Don't throw away stale bread and left-over skim milk, Madam Housewife. From them you can make that simple and well-known but nourishing dish, milk toast, the United States Department of Agriculture points out. This makes a good dish for breakfast, luncheon or supper, especially for children.

Heat the milk. Add a small quantity of butter and season to taste with salt. Pour while hot over well-toasted stale bread and serve.

### Views of a Patriot

Editor of the Red Cloud Chief

Dear Sir:—

Would you kindly allow me space in the columns of your patriotic paper for a few remarks that I wish to make in vindicating our rights and to explain as far as I am able the great incumbent duty or necessity of the United States declaring war on German Militarism? This of course was fully, ably and lucidly explained already by our illustrious and far-seeing Chief Executive, Woodrow Wilson, and his noble lieutenant, but it seems some people forget. The reason I now feel impelled to speak is with regard to the flimsy ideas and sentiments entertained by a certain religious sect of enthusiasts, who just now take advantage of some religious doctrine perhaps for selfish reasons or ulterior motives. They still comment again and again without any noticeable symptoms of exhaustion—"Thou shalt not kill, war is a horrible thing—no necessity for a war."

Now for instance if a venomous snake crawls into your yard will you, like a coward, run away and get beyond his reach? You certainly would resist and use no time in disposing of him for the future safety of you and your children.

Again if a ravenous wolf or pack of wolves enter your lot and devour your lambs or sheep you are not to rest satisfied in chasing them out of your lot or farm onto your neighbors farm; you and all your neighbors must unite, get armed and ready, round them up, so they pay the penalty for their greed and ferocious acts, then the future safety of your flock will be assured.

So you now must conclude, if you get time to think, that this war is a necessity, that we are fighting for a just, noble and holy cause and resistance is a duty we all owe to God and our country in vindicating the defence of undisputed rights.

It might do some good if that religious sect, (small as they are they may be powerful), would have made up their minds some 40 years ago, prior to the war and preached, "Thou shalt not kill," etc. to the autocrats of yonder city, (Berlin) on the Spree still and always on the Spree geographically and otherwise being intoxicated with the exuberance and multiplicity of their autocratic acts.

Also preach to them, "Thou shalt not steal, rob, plunder or destroy. Thou shalt not devastate, desolate or confiscate. Thou shalt not covet your neighbors goods, his territory, his funds or anything that belongs to him. Thou shalt not terrorize or murder non-combatants (innocent women and children) around the English coasts and steal their rest, comfort and peace of mind; or neither shalt thou sink neutral ships on the briny ocean and send innocent women and children to a watery grave, when going on their peaceful errands and legitimate business". Finally I wish this religious sect to solemnly impress on Prussianism and all ye Hohenzollerns, be not accessories to the Turkish cruel law that inflicts tortures, misery and death on the people of Syria and Mesopotamia but grant them National autonomy.

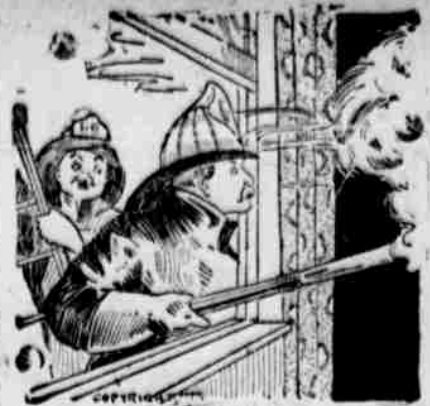
