Five nickels buy a "Thrift Stamp," Sixteen of the 25-cent "Thrift Stamps" pasted on a card can be exchanged with a few cents for a War Savings Stamp. War Savings Stamps cost \$4.12 each until February 1, and then one cent more each month until the end of the year, and on January 1, 1923, can be redeemed at any postoffice for \$5.

If you do not want to keep War Sayings Stamps until the date of ma-Jurity you can cash them at the postoffice any time on 10 days' notice, and get what you paid plus the interest earned to date.

Why Wheat Must Be Saved The necessaity for utmost saving of wheat in Nebraska is evident from the plight of France, according to agricultural extension workers of the University of Nebraska. In 1913 her wheat production exceeded 146,000,000 bushels but under the stress of war this has rapidly declined each year until the past season only 66,500,000 bushels were produced. She has lost not only some of her wheat-growing territory, but the wheat acreage throughout her provinces has also been reduced. Labor is exceedingly scarce and seed is difficult to obtain.
