The contour from shoulder to knee is important. There should be no break, but an easy sweep of line over the top of the corset straight down the hips.

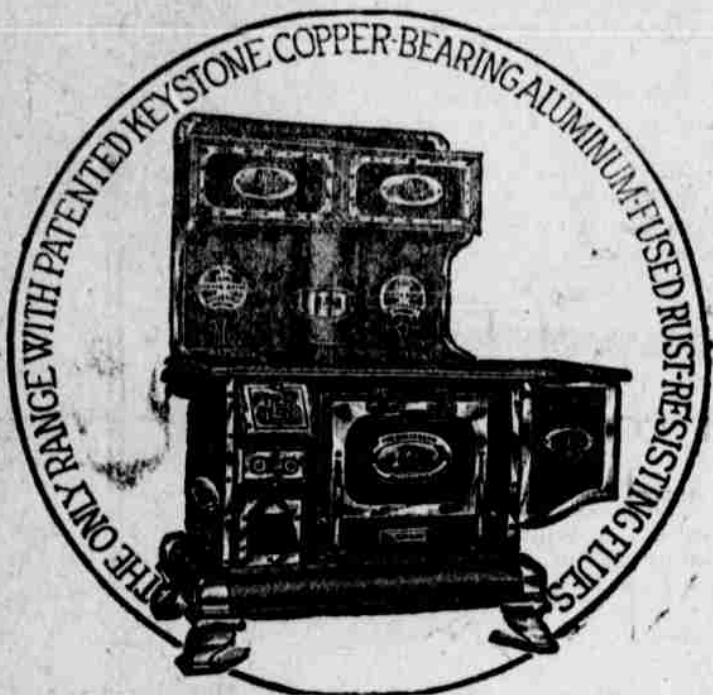

After February 24, all bakers must bake Victory bread, having at least twenty per cent substitutes. Administrator Wattles permits the use of potatoes as substitutes by bakers up to half the substitute requirements, but when so used four pounds of potatoes must be used to equal one pound of substitutes.

By new baking rules, bakers are now permitted to make and sell three-fourths pound loaves of bread. The new loaf must comply strictly with all regulations of the Food Administration and must be sold at proportionate cost. Under the rulings now, loaves weighing three-fourths pound, one pound, one and one-half pounds, two pounds, and three pounds may be baked.

Advices to Food Administrator Wattles are that manufacturers of essential food products will be able to get their full necessary sugar requirements for manufacturing purposes during the coming season. This applies particularly to packers of fruits, condensed milk, and preserving necessary vegetables. It also applies to housewives in buying sugar for preserving purposes.
