A Big Round Barn

A representative of the Chief was recently afforded the pleasure of inspecting the large round barn on the Chris. Starke stock farm about four miles east of this city. This great building, crected à few

years ago, is a prominent landmark attracting the attention of all who travel the road between Red Cloud and Guide Rock.

It is ills feet in diameter and three stories from basement to roof; basement is lighted by continuous rows of windows, and for night use there is a complete electric outfit, including engine and generator. Running water is piped to convenient points.

The basement is finished entirely in cement and fitted with cattle stalls, feed racks, watering troughs, milking machinery, drains, etc. making it both convenient and sanitary A giant silo of brick and cement stands in the open center extending upwards nearly to the roof.

The second floor is devoted to grain and feed bins, implement storage, and work shop and the upper floor holds hay, alfalfa. etc.

A large herd of bigh-grade cattle graze on the pastures and are fed from the cultivated acreage of a great fertile farm extending from this barn out over a half section.

The other buildings-residences, corn cribs, granary-most of them recently newly painted, are attractive and modern in every detail.

Mr. Starke specializes in pedigreed stock and has a number of high-priced animals in his herd one especially which cost him \$2,500 He is just at present negotiating with an eastern specialist in dairy work to come and take active charge of this department.
