Nothing more amazing has happened during the war," said a French eye-witness of Capt. Hall's battle with seven German airplanes. Shot through the lungs, he fell for over two miles, his motor going full speed all the way. Then by a miracle he recovered consciousness just long enough to straighten his machine 300 feet from ground, and glide safely into the front-line trench.

A man who has gone through an experience like that has something to write about. And yet it is only one of the adventures this famous American aviator (now dead or a prisoner of war) tells of in his new book.

Written with all the vividness, humor, and wealth of human interest that made his previous volume, "Kitchen's Mob," one of the classics of the war, this is a book that will thrill America.

There remains only the settlement of the rules and regulations—or in other words, platform and policies—by the Conventions, to make politics a leading subject for the next three months.

More stringent checking of sugar purchases has been asked of the retailers of the state by the Federal Food Administration for Nebraska. Retailers are requested to keep records of the purchases of sugar, the amounts purchased, and the name and address of the purchaser. That the 2 and 5 pound rules will be enforced to the limit is indicated in instructions to all county food administrators, that wherever a retailer violates this rule, his certificates for the ensuing month will be refused. The rules stipulate that not more than 2 pounds may be sold to city or town customers at one time, irrespective of the number in the family, and not more than 5 pounds to rural customers.
