Dedication of Service Flag

Monday evening, in the Orpheum, the teachers of Webster county and citizens of Red Cloud enjoyed an exceptionally high class music recital given by Edith Lucille Robbins of Lincoln assisted by Iva Bollen of Hastings. County Superintendent Coon has been receiving congratulations upon her success in bringing such talented musicians to this community.

Miss Robbins, Director of the Robin Voice Studio, Lincoln, Nebraska, returned recently from an extensive study under European masters, notably George Ferguson the Scotch artist. She possesses a thoroughly trained coloratura soprano voice of wide range and exceedingly rich quality. Her singing together with her attractive stage presence and winning personality charmed the audience from the very beginning of the recital.

Miss Robbins sang a program entitled "Songs From Many Lands," that included groups of English, Scotch, Irish, Italian, Swedish and Norwegian folk songs selected in such a way as to display their variety, beauty and quaintness. One group of American songs was especially well received. In the closing number, a Norwegian "Echo Song," Miss Robbins appeared in a beautiful costume presented her while she was in Norway. The dress is that worn by the peasants of the Voss-Hardanger district.

Miss Boller, pianist, is a graduate of the New England Conservatory of music. In the difficult role of accompanist, she supported the singer with a sympathetic skill rarely seen. As a soloist, she gave evidence of artistic skill and faultless technique in a group of four piano selections.

As a part of the program, the Webster County Teachers' Service Flag with 32 stars was dedicated. Nettie Springer read "The Service Flag," Assistant State Superintendent Alice Florer led in the singing of America and Superintendent Coon made the dedicatory address. After the evening's exercises, all teachers and the parents of teachers in service repaired to Ege's ice cream parlors upon invitation of Miss Coon, where a social hour was enjoyed and red, white and blue ice cream and wafers were served.

Red Cross Memorial

A public memorial service in honor of Gilbert Sutherland will be held in Red Cloud Sunday evening August 12th from the Orpheum theater, under the auspices of the Red Cross. Gilbert Sutherland was born March 23, 1895 at Covington, Ky., and came to Nebraska in Nov. 1916 and at the time he entered the war was making his home with Mr. and Mrs. D. R. Stankard south of Red Cloud. Mr. Sutherland registered for war service June 25, 1917 and went to Camp Funston Sept. 20th, 1917, and March 1918 went to France for overseas duty. Mr. Cather of Bladen was the first and Mr. Sutherland second to be killed in action on the battle field in France from Webster county. The young men who die for their country should be individually honored. All churches and their pastors are urged to be present at this service to aid the Home Service Committee in this memorial event. A program will be arranged, several addresses given and sacred and patriotic music sung. All Home Guard and G. A. R. organizations are specially invited to attend in uniform. All people are urged to express their appreciation of Our Heroic dead by attending this memorial service.
