PROPUSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

The following proposed amendment to the constitution of the State of Nebranka, as hereinafter set forth in full, is submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska to be voted from and Discounts upon at the general election to be Overdrafts ... held Tucaday, Nevember 5th, A. D. Treas Certificates.

A JOINT RESOLUTION to amend Current expenses, taxes and inter-Section one (1) of Article seven (7) of the Constitution of the State of

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Nebraska:

Section 1. That Section One of Article Seven of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska be and the same hereby is amended by striking out the

"Second. Persons of foreign birth who shall have declared their intention to become citizens comformably to the laws of the United States on the subject of naturalization, at least thirty days prior to an election.'

And inserting in the place of the made a trip to Lincoln on business words so stricken, the fellowing words:

> "Second. Persons of foreign birth who shall have become citizens of the United States by naturalization or otherwise conformably to the laws of the United States at least thirty days prior to an election.

Sec. 2. That at the general elec-tion nineteen hundred and eighteen (1918) there shall be submitted to the electors of the state for their approval easy all of last week ploughing for or rejection the foregoing proposes amandment to the constitution reinting to the right of suffrage. At such election, on the ballot of each elector voting for or against said proposed amendment, shall be written or printed the words: "For proposed amend-ment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage," and "Against said proposed amendment to the consuftation relating to the right of

Sec. 3. If such amendment shall be approved by a majority of all electors voting at such election, said a half inch rain had put the reads in amendment shall constitute Section One (1) Article Seven (7) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska.
