Sudden Summons

The community was shocked by news of the death of Roy Hutchison, at the Nicholas Stern hospital, Omaha, about six o'clock Friday evening, Nov. 13, 1918, from pneumonia.

Roy was a Red Cloud boy, born Aug. 25th, 1883, and grew to manhood here, attending High School and building up a large circle of sincere friends, and developing unusual executive ability which placed him in positions of trust.

About four years ago he married Miss Bernice Bellman, of Franklin. They located in Omaha where he was employed as traveling salesman by the Cudahy Packing Co. and was later promoted to local sales manager.

A son, Geo. William, age 3 years and the bereaved wife mourn the loss of a loving husband and kind father. Immediately upon receiving notice of their son's serious condition his parents started for Omaha but were unable to reach that city in time to see him alive—death came several hours before their arrival.

The mortal clay was brought here and funeral services held from the Red Cloud home Tuesday morning, Rev. J. Hammel officiating. Services at the cemetery were under auspices of the Masons, of which fraternity Roy was a member.

Geo. Baker is Called

Geo. Baker, formerly resident of Red Cloud, familiarly called "Uncle" by almost everyone, passed to the great beyond, at his home in Santa Ana, Cal., Sunday morning, November 17th, 1918.

He was just fairly past 80 years of age when death came, and will be remembered as a genial story-teller—a man whose personality was always pleasing. About two years ago he visited Red Cloud and it is recalled that he then expected to become a centenarian.

Nancy Storey, whom he married in 1867, was his first wife. There were six daughters three of whom, with the mother, went to their home beyond the skies many years ago. The survivors are Mrs. Florence Saladen of Red Cloud, Mrs. Minnie Durrett of Lebanon, Kan., and Mrs. Ida Hansen of Rosalia.

Subsequent to his adoption of California as a home "Uncle" George again essayed matrimony and a widow, together with other relatives, mourns his departure to the hourglass from which no traveler returneth.

APPLICANTS FOR SUCH A LABEL may obtain them either at the office of the secretary or the Post Office.

If anyone knows of any soldier or any worker in any of the war activities in France who will not receive a Christmas Parcel the Red Cross wants the name of such person and the organization will send the Christmas box. We want everyone over there to have one.
