NEBRASKA INCIDENTS BOILED TO A FEW LINES

Occurrences Over the Cornhusker State Chronicled in Paragraph Form for the Busy Reader.

Mrs. Ida Bauman of Martinsburg, who brought action for \$50,000 against forty different saloonkeepers of Thurston, Dixon and Knox counties alleging that her husband died of alcoholism, and that the defendants furnished the liquor that caused disease and death, was awarded a verdict for \$1,500 against three Dixon county saloon keepers by a jury at Norfolk. All the other were acquitted.

Farmers of Box Butte county are going to make some real improvements on their places this year. If loans they are obtaining from the federal farm loan bank is any criterion. During a single week farmers of the county borrowed \$11,000 from Uncle Sam through the county agent.

John Hann, road house proprietor of near Grand Island, was made to kiss the American flag and to head a parade through the principal streets of Grand Island by indignant citizens as the result of his threatening a returned soldier with a shotgun, after a discussion of pro-Germanism.

A jury investigating the death of Mrs. Francis Blaska on the Blaska farm near Ellsworth, Cherry county, found that she came to her death as the result of a severe beating with a heavy harness tug with an iron eye-bolt at one end, by her husband, Josef Blaska.

Wayne citizens are determined that the city's streets will be paved this season. A resolution urging such action was adopted at a mass meeting, as well as a proposal for the so-called city manager form of municipal government.

Lincoln women have not prepared to take advantage of their new right to suffrage to the extent that members of the suffrage association have deemed desirable, according to the registration list at the city clerk's office.

George H. Smith, 80, wealthy German farmer, who owns 800 acres of Adams county land, four of whose eight sons were taken in the draft, was fined \$300 on a disloyalty charge at Lincoln by Federal Judge Munger.

Seven attacks and attempted assaults on white women by negroes occurred in Omaha and vicinity during the past few weeks, and people of the metropolis are considerably wrought up over the outrages.

Keith county citizens are setting the pace in Nebraska in the agitation for better state roads. Some big improvements on the county's highways are expected this summer.

The new St. Patrick's Parochial school at McCook was dedicated with appropriate ceremony. A large gathering from the surrounding community attended the affair.

That both Fort Omaha and Fort Crook will be retained as balloon school posts is indicated by advices to the Omaha Chamber of Commerce from Washington.

Bankers of Butler county have agreed to loan money to boys and girls of the county who wish to engage in the business of raising pigs this summer.

The people's caucus at Broken Bow put up a municipal ticket, headed by C. E. Tooley for mayor. The resolution adopted called for sewerage and street paving.

The motor truck company operating between Lincoln and Table Rock plans to extend its lines into all parts of the state in time.

Red Cross workers of Omaha have knitted a total of 45,428 garments since August 1917, according to leaders of the movement.

Senator Hitchcock of Nebraska plans a speaking tour over the nation as the administration's spokesman for the league of nations.

Indications are that farmers of Box Butte and other northwestern counties will plant the usual size potato crop this season.

Captain Griffith A. Demay of Indianola has been awarded the British military cross for gallantry in the war.

J. E. Haase was elected mayor of Norfolk by a narrow margin over Matt Shafter, Jr., the women's candidate.

Farmers of the Liberty vicinity have organized to make war on gophers the coming season.

Gage county is making an effort to retain its tuberculosis expert even though congress did not provide funds for his salary and expenses.

Douglas county commissioners are considering the advisability of building an ice plant to supply ice to the court house, county hospital and other county institutions.

The annual inter-high school stock judging contest will be held at the State Farm near Lincoln, March 29. High schools from all parts of the state are planning to send teams.

Dean Tancock, chaplain of Nebraska University base hospital No. 43, who returned to Omaha from France a few days ago, expressed the belief that the Brest trouble is due to some political scheme.

The death of Mrs. Josef Blaska, who was reported by her husband to have died with influenza at the home place in Cherry county, has, upon investigation by neighbors, been practically proven a foul murder. The body was found in a cow shed, terribly mutilated, with all indications pointing towards the husband as perpetrator.

Mrs. Alvin Bockweller, wife of a farmer, was killed, four other persons were injured and thousands of dollars' worth of damage done to farm property by a tornado that swept a path a half mile wide and four miles long between Colon and Cedar Bluffs, Saunders county. The storm was accompanied by a heavy hail, which done a great deal of damage in several eastern Nebraska counties.

C. L. Landry of a Denver detective agency, who was implicated in the killing of Miss Sylvia Kelly of Morrill last December, was found guilty of manslaughter by a jury at Scottsbluff. Sheriff Sherman of Scottsbluff county will go on trial soon under a charge of being an accessory to the crime.

A number of patrons of the Arapahoe Telephone company sent a petition to the state railway commission asking if there was not some way to prevent the use of German over their phones. Nebraska at present has no law to prevent such a practice.

Since the removal of all government restrictions on the buying and selling of hogs the price has shot up with great rapidity at South Omaha but predictions are being made that the prices will decrease before long.

Plans prepared for a new \$80,000 school building, to be erected at Bayard, by Architect Gott of Scottsbluff, were found to be structurally inadequate by State Engineer Johnson, who ordered a new set of plans drawn.

Of Nebraska's total population, 63 per cent will live on the proposed 5,000 miles of state roads, and 85 per cent will live within five miles. State Engineer George E. Johnson told 200 road boosters at Lincoln.

Members of the Beatrice Farmers' Co-operative Grain company voted to adopt the union plan organization. The company will either buy or build an elevator. The organization has a membership of 140.

Lutherans of Lehigh have decided to erect a new church. The structure will be 32x92 feet in size with a steeple 72 feet high. All services in the new edifice will be in the English language.

A total of 65,000 persons attended the 1919 automobile show at Omaha, a record crowd unequalled in the history of the affair. Sales are estimated to have been for in excess of \$5,000,000.

The Johnson county farm bureau has made arrangements with Captain A. C. Wilcox of Mount Vernon, Ia., to assume the office of county agricultural and demonstration agent.

Stockmen of Dawes county have been losing a number of calves lately with blackleg. Vaccination as a means of checking the disease in the district is being urged by the county agent.

Citizens of Harrington will vote on a proposition to bond the city for a sufficient sum to erect a soldiers' and sailors' memorial in the form of a library or auditorium on April 8.

Cost of production and other matters connected with the laundry business will be discussed by laundry owners of Nebraska at their annual convention at Omaha, March 27-29.

At a monster mass meeting at Tekamah it was demonstrated beyond any doubt, that citizens of the city are strong for sewerage and paving, and as soon as possible.

A quarter section farm near Filley sold the other day for \$35,500, or approximately \$225 per acre. Gage county land is gradually climbing skyward in price.

Fire destroyed the Independent Battery Service building at Syracuse, entailing with its entire contents, entailing a loss of approximately \$16,000.

Nebraska City is working out plans to erect a suitable structure as a memorial to the boys of Oto county who fought in the world war.

Sufficient number of property owners of Spencer have signed petitions to make certain the paving of the business streets of the town.

Chadron is now a city of the first class, having been acknowledged such by Governor McKelvie. The city is now divided into four wards.

John Menter, near De Witt, closed a deal for the sale of his 200-acre Gage county farm to John Schroeder for \$40,000.

The Keith County Community club has completed contracts for the fourth annual roundup at Ogallala July 3, 4 and 5.

Citizens of Humboldt are agitating the question of paving a number of the principal streets of the city.

A concerted campaign is to be made by farmers of Buffalo county to rid the county of prairie dogs.

An outbreak of hog cholera which started last month in Box Butte county, is now under control.

State officials confiscated 5,000 gallons of grape wine of an estimated value of \$35,000 at the Walker vineyard near Omaha. The raid was said to be the biggest haul of liquor made in the state of Nebraska in its entire history.

Anders Jensen, wealthy Minden farmer, charged with saying President Wilson should be killed and the kaiser substituted in his place, has been ordered interned at Fort Douglas, Utah, according to Federal District Attorney Allen.

Following a tilt with the state railway commission at Lincoln, Union Pacific officials announced that train service on seven branch lines in Nebraska, suspended as a war emergency measure, is to be resumed.


Health Commissioner Chapman of Lincoln claims Omaha has more small-pox cases than any other city in the United States, regardless of population, and Nebraska has more cases than any other state. Lincoln, he says, has kept the epidemic down to twenty-six cases since December. He urged a statewide vaccination.

Home Town Helps

MADE ORNAMENT TO TOWN

Oregon Concrete Grain Elevator "Camouflaged" Into Really Artistic-Looking Building.

Lines as pleasing as those of an old-world castle have been incorporated into a modern and equipped grain elevator of re-enforced concrete, recently erected at Ione, Ore., at a cost of approximately \$40,000. Symmetry has been obtained by arranging two circular and two semicircular storage tanks either side of a central rectangular structure and by topping the whole with a pleasing cupola. A heavy black cornice contrasts sharply with the white finish of the walls. The ground dimensions are 62 by 33 1/2 feet, and its height is 124 feet over all. It contains a total of 20 bins with a capacity of 100,000 bushels. A special feature is the arrangement of these bins so as to allow an unob-

structed floor space of 12 by 33 feet on the same level as the car floors. The construction is such that the weight of the overhanging bins is transferred to points of contact in the solid slab of concrete beneath the building.—Popular Science Magazine.

WASHINGTON AS MODEL CITY

Chicago Newspaper Points to National Capital as an Example Worthy of Being Followed.

It is strange that American cities have been so slow to appreciate the value of a plan as it is exemplified at the national capital, remarks the Chicago Tribune. The city of Washington was planned by the best landscape architect the founders of the republic could call to their aid. The beauty, spaciousness and facilities of the city with its great open circles and radiating streets, affording varied sites for residences and commanding locations for public and commercial buildings, impress every visitor and justify the pride of every citizen in the capital of his country. But Chicago's plan, even though it involves the reconstruction of its planless areas, is still greater, because it provides a water front that any city in the world could envy, and because it comprehends all parts of the city and starts the people of every section on further plans to improve and beautify their home surroundings.

Importance of City Planning.

As the best humanitarians hold that man builds upon the basis of character, so it is that cities in their physical planning, as it affects their surroundings, must provide for the finer things that tend to make the mind as well as the body rich. The city plan, in view of these conditions, becomes one of the most important and far-reaching influences of the times.

What is done now for the future must be done right!

Compared Ghent to Venice.

Ghent was approached in 1641 by John Evelyn, driving along the Brussels road in a coach and six with which Sir Henry de Vic, the English agent, had accommodated him. He had traveled to Ghent "to meet my Lord of Arundel, Earl Marshal of England," and he compares Ghent to Venice because "the Lys and the Scheldt meeting in this vast city, divide it into 26 islands, which are united by many bridges." The population of the British in the old Flemish city recalls the time, many centuries ago, when Ghent, under the van Artevelde, was the powerful ally of Edward III. Evelyn mentions having seen a palace of Plantagenet memories.
