Held Special Meeting

Red Cloud, May 12, 1919.
Board of Education met in special session with all members present, President Weesner presiding.

The chairman appointed the following committees:

Buildings and Grounds—Dr. Hoxsey Chairman, Beezley, Grimes.

Claims—Pope Chairman, Sherwood and Hoxsey.

Discipline—Sherwood Chairman, Hoxsey and Beezley.

Text Books and Supplies—Grimes Chairman, Beezley and Hoxsey.

Finance—Beezley Chairman, Pope and Grimes.

Teachers and Employes—Pope Chairman, Grimes, Sherwood.

Motion made by Beezley and seconded by Hoxsey that Mrs. Hogue be retained as grade teacher but to be transferred to the 5th grade. Motion carried. On motion it was decided that the employment of all teachers should be left to the Teachers' Committee and they are authorized to contract with teachers and name salaries for same.

Adjourned to meet at the next regular session, Monday, June 2nd.

Peterson Ice Plant

Is Now In Operation

Although not entirely completed Peterson's new artificial ice plant is in operation, turning out large cakes of pure, clean, solid ice, at the rate of four tons every twenty-four hours. Constant requests for the product caused the manager, Frank Peterson, to begin operations at once. The machinery was tested out, the brine prepared and the "first batch" of water put into the containers on Saturday night, which was drawn from the containers in the form of ice early Monday morning. Considerable more time was required for this "freeze" than will be for those following.

Another section is being prepared and when completed the capacity of the entire plant will be ten and one-half tons every twenty-four hours. The plant will be kept in operation constantly, Carl McArthur being the man in charge on the day run and Ed Fry looking after the night shift.

A twenty horse power gas engine is being used to furnish power at present but as soon as the new motors have been received and installed the plant will be operated entirely by electric power.

A huge refrigerator will be built, in which to store the surplus supply, in the near future and when all is completed it will be one of the most modern plants of its kind in this part of the state.

R. L. Ripple of Ft. Morgan, Colorado, secretary of the Morgan county Shorthorn Association and J. W. McIlrath foreman of the J. P. Curry ranches were in this vicinity the last of the week interviewing the Shorthorn breeders and looking over their herds. These gentlemen purchased one heifer and two cows from Steward & Sons. Messrs Ripple and McIlrath complimented the Stewards on the fine grade of stock they raise and stated that they hoped to see more of Webster county's farmers take to the raising of the high grade stock.

Commissioners Proceedings

Red Cloud, May 14, 1919.
The County Board of Commissioners met at one o'clock pursuant to adjournment, with all members present.

County Treasurer was instructed to reduce the assessment of James Brown, owner of e/2 of sw/4 section 4-1-9. Said assessment to be reduced from \$1445 to \$1325 assessed value said reduction amounting to \$120.

Motion made by Thomas and seconded by Waldo that the various Precinct Assessors be allowed \$5 per day from the first day of April according to the new law regulating their salaries, as passed by the last legislature of Nebraska. Motion carried.

On motion John Pavlick was appointed Road Overseer of district No. 11 1/2.

The Bond of C. M. Wilson as Road Overseer of district 15 was approved by Board.

Motion made by Waldo and seconded by Shidler that the salary of O. J. Kaley as janitor of court house be increased from \$75 to \$85 per month commencing June 1, 1919. Motion carried.

Ed Pegg Laid to Rest

After an illness of about three years duration Edward B. Pegg passed to his eternal reward on Sunday morning at the home of his brother, Ben, west of this city.

The deceased was born here November 14, 1884, and made this his home practically all of the time. He was about 34 years of age at the time of his death.

About three years ago he was stricken with rheumatism, later resulting in diabetes. Various health resorts were visited and every effort made to restore the young man to health, but all proved of no avail. His passing away makes the fifth death in the family in the past five years and the second within the past three weeks.

He is survived by his mother, Mrs. L. V. Pegg; four brothers, Ben and Will of this city, John of Oklahoma City and Lloyd of San Pedro, California, two sisters, Mrs. Chris Jensen of this city and Mrs. Hattie Martin of River-ton.

Funeral services were conducted from the Methodist church, Tuesday afternoon at two o'clock, Rev. J. D. Hammil in charge. Interment was made in the city cemetery.

The club also decided to have a celebration in the future for the returned soldiers of the county.
