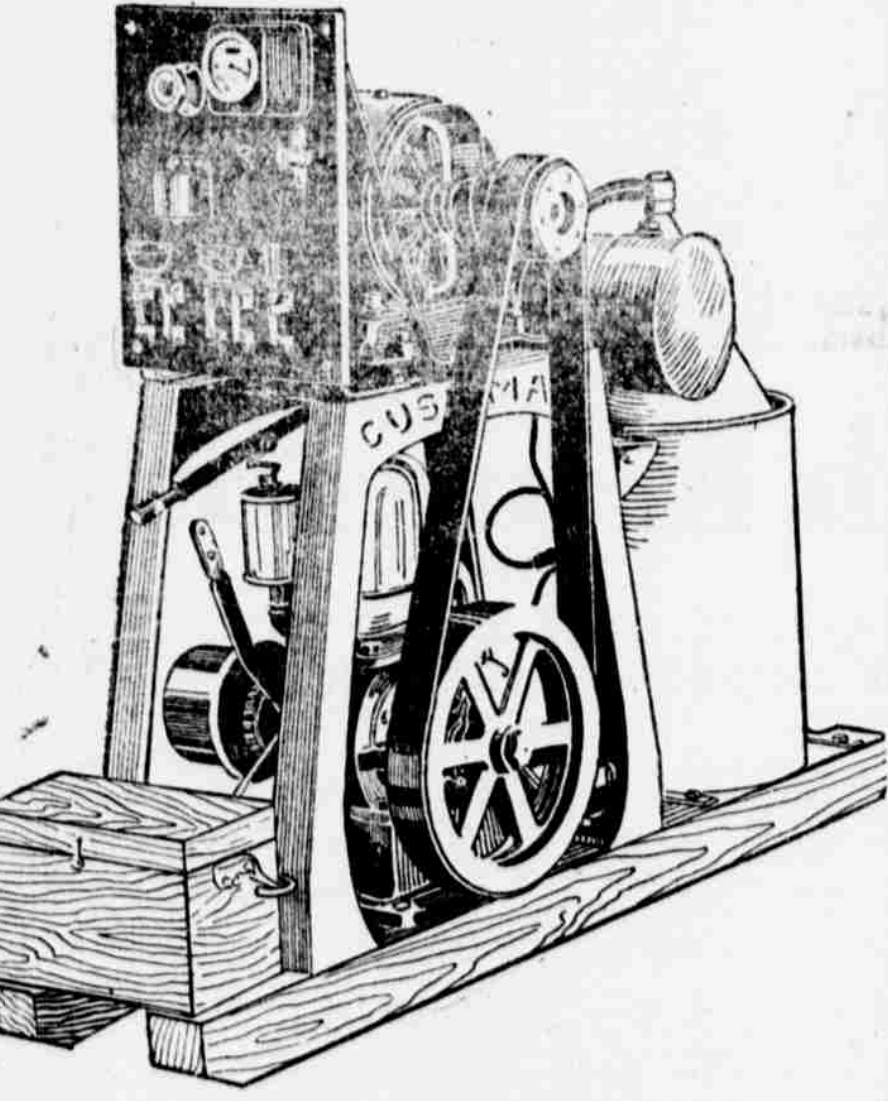

Farm Bureau Notes

JUNIOR WORK

Junior work in Webster County will be in charge of Mr. J. C. Hagey of Guide Rock. Mr. Hagey received his appointment last week and started to work at once. He is qualified for the work, having held a similar position in Thayer County.

He will have charge of all the boys' and girls' Club work in the county with the exception of the Calf Club and the Pig Club which were started before Mr. Hagey was appointed.

PIG CLUB

Rules For The Red Cloud Farmers' Institute Pig Club:

- 1st. Members must be old enough to feed and care for their pigs but not more than 18 years of age.
- 2nd. Each member must feed and care for one or more pigs, beginning before the pig is more than 12 weeks old. Each member must begin to feed their pigs before July 1st, 1919.
- 3rd. The use of Pure Bred Pigs is recommended but grades may be used.
- 4th. Select a good pig from your father's herd or call at the county agent's office and he will inform you where you can get the kind and breed you want.
- 5th. Each member must exhibit their pig at the Red Cloud Farmers' Institute this fall.

PREMIUMS

Premiums amounting to \$100 will be awarded at the Red Cloud Farmers' Institute this fall. Surely this is worth trying for. The pleasure and experience you will have trying to grow a prize winning pig is worth your efforts even if you do not win a prize.

ENROLLMENT

Boys and girls will write or call at the county agent's office for application blanks and try feeding a pig for the pig Club.
