Salvation Army Seeks Funds

A statewide drive for funds for the Salvation Army will be made during the week of September 21-27, at which time an attempt will be made to raise \$512,000, for the purpose of providing a New State Home and Maternity Hospital for Women and Children; New State Headquarters Building, having under one roof a Young Women's Boarding Home, Working Men's Club as a substitute for the Saloon, Relief Department for aid of the poor and support of work for the year.

Webster County's quota is \$3800, divided as follows: Red Cloud \$800, Blue Hill \$900, Bladen \$400, Guide Rock \$400, Cowles \$300, Inavale \$200 and Rosemont \$100.

As the campaign will be conducted on an economical basis as possible those called upon to assist in the drive are expected to give their time and service gratis.

In order to give the matter as much publicity as possible a committee composed of Messrs Beebe, Edson, McArthur and Burress toured the county in a car Tuesday morning calling upon the various newspapers and securing local chairman in the towns visited.

Boos, Rosemont; L. E. Spence, Bladen; C. H. Waldo and James Silvey, Inavale.

This is a worthy cause to help and everyone should contribute willingly.
