Water Case in Lincoln Court

Practically all of the business men of the city are in Lincoln this week attending the September term of the district court, the case interesting them being E. Boyd Smith vs. J. H. Bailey and several other citizens of Red Cloud. The case was begun on Tuesday before Judge Stewart, and jury, Attorneys Blackledge, Gilham and Maurer are representing the defendants.

The plaintiff alleges that in June 1911 he, and his partner, entered into a contract with the defendants, the plaintiff later succeeding to the rights of his partner.

By the terms of this contract the plaintiff was to drill wells and construct a system that would add 250,000 gallons, daily, to the Red Cloud supply of water, and that he was to receive the sum of \$1 per day for the water furnished. Plaintiff states that he carried out his part of the contract for two years and was paid the \$1 a day. At the end of that time, plaintiff alleges that defendants took possession of his plant and converted it to their own use. The defendants claim that plaintiff never furnished the water as contracted for and that he abandoned the project, also they deny that they ever appropriated his plant.

This case has aroused considerable interest in the past and the community, at large, anxiously await a decision in the matter.
