Deputy Sheriff Murdered

O. H. Munger, a druggist at Athol, Kansas, a town in the western part of Smith county, was shot down Saturday morning on a road about a mile east of Athol.

About two weeks previous a number of stores in that town were burglarized. Mr. Munger was sworn in as a deputy sheriff and it is believed that his persistency in endeavoring to run down the criminals was the reason for his murder.

It is reported that the two men were in the town a short time before the shooting and drove east, out of town, Munger following them in his Buick. When out about a mile, the two men stopped their car and when Munger drove up they shot him. He died almost instantly. They then transferred their belongings to the Buick and drove away.

The last report of the murderers was from Guide Rock, the same evening when a Buick car bearing two men answering their description passed through town. Later the Buick was found near Superior.

It is reported that a reward of \$200 is offered for their capture.

The funeral of the murdered man was held at Smith Center Monday.

Waldo Store Robbed

On Thursday evening of last week the Waldo general store at Inavale was burglarized. Entrance was gained through a window in the rear of the store building. An investigation revealed that the thieves had taken thirteen bolts of silk, twenty five pairs of shoes and several pairs of gloves. To date no clues to the identity of the thieves have been secured.

No Hand Grenade Banks

The Savings Organization of the Tenth Federal Reserve District has just been informed by the Treasury Department that the Secretary of War, deciding that hand grenades converted into savings banks should not be sent broadcast throughout the country, has cancelled his arrangement to furnish grenades to the Treasury Department.

Although more than 300,000 of these grenades has been sold to the banks in the Tenth District, the children who have entered into the savings plan during their vacation, must content themselves with Certificates of Appreciation issued by the Treasury Department for their services. These certificates are being prepared in Washington and will be issued by the Savings Organization.

The War Department gave its approval of the grenade distribution several weeks ago. Its recent decision comes as a surprise but was evidently made on account of complaints made that the grenades might become a menace to the safety of children and families owing to the possibility of again converting them into dangerous weapons.
