Prizes for Short Horns

Henry Gilham, Secretary of the Farmers Institute has received a letter from F. W. Harding, Secretary of the American Shorthorn Breeders Association, Chicago, Illinois stating that this Association is offering prizes for the purpose of encouraging Higher Class Shorthorn sires.

Mr. Harding also states that the association has selected The Red Cloud Farmers Institute for an appropriation of a \$25 prize for the Champion Short-horn bull over 12 months. A handsome ribbon signifying the award will also be given. The check for this amount will be mailed direct from the Association to the exhibitor of the champion bull upon notice from the secretary of the Institute.

Mr. Harding suggests, that a like amount be added to this prize by the local institute, the same to be classed in two prizes: \$10 for the Reserve Champion bull over one year old and \$15 for the Champion cow or heifer of any age. Ribbons will also be furnished to accompany these awards.

Webster County Recognized

State Superintendent W. H. Clemmons announces that a new distribution of normal training schools will be made throughout the state. In the past, it is found, that the eastern part of the state has had more such schools, in proportion, than the western part of the state. He has called attention to the terms of the law and warns the schools to come up to the standard and see that they are running according to law not merely according to rule.

The state appropriates \$1000 for a period of two years for the support of these schools. There are from one to five in each representative district.

In the list of districts where normal training schools have been designated for 1919 and 1920 is found that number 43 is given to Red Cloud and Blue Hill.
