**Commissioners Proceedings**

Red Cloud, Neb., Oct. 7, 1919.  
 This being the date for one of the regular statute meetings of the year, the County Board met at 1 p. m. with all members present.

A petition signed by the Trustees of the Plainview cemetery in Glenwood precinct, Webster county, was filed with the Board asking for the enlargement of their cemetery by the addition of two acres of land on the west side of same, now owned by John Zoph. County Clerk instructed to notify Mr. Zoph of said petition.

At the request of the County Commissioners the Board was asked to select two tractors and two maintainers for the purpose of maintaining the Federal Aid Road in Webster county. Said tractors and maintainers to be paid for out of the Webster county apportionment of the State Highway fund. After balloting, the Board selected Case Tractors and the Maintainers manufactured by the Highway Maintainer Co., of Havelock, Nebraska.

The resignation of J. W. Borden as Justice of the Peace in Inavale precinct was accepted by the Board.

The reports of the offices of County Clerk and Clerk of the District Court were approved by the Board, according to the audit made of these offices by John W. Tulley, Public Accountant. Proper settlements were made with the county by the above officers.

Albert Albers was appointed Road Overseer of District No. 4 1/2 Oak Creek precinct.
