Armistice Day Observed

As scheduled, Armistice Day, Tuesday, November 11th was observed in Red Cloud. The rains of the two days previous interfered to a considerable extent with the carrying out of the program which had been arranged for the day. The almost impassible condition of the roads made it impossible for many of the rural people to be present. This also was impossible for the canceling of the parade in which the school children were to take part. Aviator Cochrane was unable to make his flights as planned as he was marooned in the mud at his landing place near Inavale.

At 1:30 the Red Cloud band rendered several selections in front of the Orpheum theater, at which place the program was carried out, Prof. Holtzen presiding.

The program was opened with the singing of America by the audience, followed by selections by the band and the High School quartette and sextette.

Attorney L. H. Blackledge delivered a very appropriate address, his subject being "Patriotism and our Debt of Gratitude to the American Soldiers." The speaker called attention to the meaning of the event that they were celebrating and also stated that the day would be honored throughout all time to come. He also mentioned our methods of warfare were more efficient and successful than those of Europe. He took issue with those who thought the U. S. soldiers should have fought all the way to Berlin, as many lives were saved by not doing so and concluded by saying that the United States needed military preparation to safeguard the future of this country.

The program was brought to a close by the singing of the Star Spangled Banner by all present, after which the band and Red Cloud High School foot ball team marched to the local foot ball grounds where the High School team defeated the Pick Up team of former players of the city.

Red Cloud, Nebr. Nov. 11, 19. The County Board of Commissioners met as per adjournment at 1 p. m. with all members present.

The first business taken up was the claim of Oliver G. Sheppard of \$225 for damages caused by reason of the removal of a culvert in Oak Creek precinct on August 21, 1918. Mr. Sheppard was represented by his attorney, A. M. Walters of Blue Hill, and the county by Howard S. Fox, County Attorney. The Board, after hearing the testimony of several witnesses for Mr. Sheppard, decided they desired to have some evidence from the other side, and postponed a decision on the claim until the next meeting of the Board.

Attorney Walters of Blue Hill presented to the Board the claim of Claus Rose for erroneous assessment on lots 6-8 and 10, Blk 10, Rosemont. This matter was referred to the County Attorney for investigation.

The bond of Albert Alber as Road Overseer of Dist. No. 4½ was approved by the Board.

A letter was read from the State Auditor asking that Webster county settle the balance due the state on the old Insane account from Webster county amounting to \$2337.47. County Clerk was instructed to draw a warrant for this amount on the General Fund in payment of the same.
