Three women appear on the list of supervisors, one having been appointed to serve in the State of New York, one n Texas and one in Nevada. This is the first time in the history of the High Schools and at Community Census Bureau that women have been selected to fill these positions.

Of the 372 supervisors chosen approximately, 100 are lawyers. Ex-service men come next in numbers, and editors rank third with more than forty appointments. Farmers are represented with about 25, while educators, a close race.

Each supervisor appointed had to undergo rigid tests as to his fitness for the position, especial stress having been laid on character and experience. "No man was appointed a supervisor for the Fourteenth Census," said Mr. Rogers, "until every possible guarantee was given as to his ability and honesty. Character was at all times the leading and predominating consid-eration with the Census Bureau in every appointment made."
