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**COUNTY SCHOOL NOTES**  
(By County Superintendent)

In preparing for eighth grade examination, each teacher should have the board get half enough eighth grade question books of Oscar Warp of Minden, Nebraska, and one half enough of Milburn-Scott of Beatrice, Nebraska. The books are 25c apiece—20c (I think) when purchased in any quantity. Several schools could go in together and get advantage of the lower price.

The eighth graders have to pass in Bookkeeping and English Composition.

An easy text in Bookkeeping is Principles of Bookkeeping and Farm Accounts by Bexell and Nichols. The American Book Company publishes the book. It might be well to get a manual for each school seeing that the new laws do not require Bookkeeping in the teacher's certificate so the teacher is not expected to know very much about it. A good text for English Composition is Pearson & Kirchway "Essentials of English. New Terminology," published by the American Book Company.

Howard Rickard is now teaching in the school where Miss Chaplin resigned. She takes her school of last year at an increase of salary.

The Department of the Interior announce a National Conference on Rural School Consolidation at Cedar Falls, Iowa, February 17 to 19, inclusive. They say the one room school should have the best qualified teachers in the whole public system, if you are going to place the best qualified teachers any where for here is where the Herculean task is. It is not the place for amateur adventurers or juvenile pretenders. "Wherever the nation and the state permit a man to go with his family in an honest effort to earn an honest living, it is the duty of the nation and the state to follow that family and to provide the children thereof with adequate school privileges." This is not done in at least one hundred thousand rural schools of the United States.

The new map has been finished—with very few changes—those spoken of last week and a new district formed from the north two miles of Cowles district and the south three miles of Blue Hill District. In doing this, the west line of Rosemont was moved half a mile east for its whole length.

The committee have tried their best to please everybody—a large sized attempt. Any one that is dissatisfied have redress. Send to the County Superintendent for a protest sheet. Get 25 per cent of signers from the proposed districts affected and send to the State Superintendent. It has gone out of the Committee's hands now and they could do nothing more if they would.

**What Everyone Should Know**

The Fourteenth Decennial Census of the United States is on!

Under the immediate direction of E. R. Sadler, Supervisor of the 5th census district of Nebraska, census enumerators will call at every dwelling house in this community to secure the information necessary to fill out the questions contained on the printed census schedules.

Questions covering the following points will be asked of every person in the United States:

Sex; color or race; age at last birthday; whether single, married, widowed or divorced; birthplace of person, enumerated and birthplaces of father and mother, giving names of both country and province if foreign born; occupation, specifying trade or profession, also industry in which employed; whether attending school; whether able to read; whether able to write; whether able to speak English; whether home is owned or rented, and if owned whether home is free of incumbrance or is mortgaged.

Persons of foreign birth will be asked questions concerning these additional points:

Year of immigration to the United States; whether naturalized, and if so the year of naturalization; mother tongue or native language.

**EVERY FARM VISITED**

Census enumerators will also call at every farm in this community to secure the information necessary to fill out the questions contained on the agricultural schedule.

Each farmer will be asked questions concerning the acreage and value of his farm; whether he owns, rents or partly owns and partly rents the land he farms; the value of the buildings, machinery and implements belonging to his farm; the quantity of all crops raised on his farm during the year 1919; and many other questions which cover all possible farm operations.

An absolutely accurate and complete census vitally concerns the welfare of this community and of every person living in it. The official population for the next ten years will be determined by the census of 1920.

Be ready with your answers when the census man calls at your house.
