Farm Bureau Notes

CAN A POOR BOY OWN A HERD OF PURE BREDS?

The question arises in the mind of almost every young man, who is desirous of going into the live stock business, "The manner in which to begin."

There are three alternatives open: namely, a complete herd of pure bred stock as a foundation, a herd of grades, or a division of the available capital, putting one portion into grades and another portion into one good pure bred female, and from this start a pure bred herd.

For most young men, beginners in the live stock game, the first alternative is out of the question. Only good pure bred should be considered, and such stock are far beyond the means of the average young farmer. The complete herd plan is therefore eliminated.

Too many beginners fail by the wayside and hitch themselves to the second alternative, the grade. The purchase of foundation stock does not eat such a big hole in the available funds, and maximum returns are more immediate. If the same amount of capital is available for investment in grades or pure bred, undoubtedly for the first few years, the grades will return the larger dividends, but after that time the pure bred will come to the front. Some have used grades as a means of raising sufficient funds to later start with pure bred, by a complete change of herd. That, in many ways, is not a bad method, for it gives the beginner an opportunity to learn the best practices of herd management from an investment, which does not allow so great a loss in the case of misfortune.

But to my mind, the last alternative, a combination of grades, and a good pure bred female, for a foundation, offers the greatest possibilities, for the inexperienced person, with limited capital. The grades will bring comparatively quick returns, which can be used for maintaining the business, while the pure bred female will be laying the foundation, and building up a herd for future returns, far in excess of that, which grades could ever give.

Do not fool away your time on grades, without building for the future, for no matter how highly bred they may be, they are still grades. By starting with a good matron, you can build up your herd while you are preparing yourself to handle them, and your mistakes will be less costly. In a few years time you will have a complete herd of pure bred, a herd, which you will know from the ground up.

By starting with a single foundation female, there is not a young man in Webster county, no matter how meager his fortune, who cannot eventually own a herd of pure bred. Choose carefully, follow your plan thoroughly and in the course of a few years, a herd of superior pure bred will have replaced the grades.

It is unique in that it offers education in all three branches, takes care of the man's physical needs, offers recreation, and pays him during the three years for which he enlists.

The soldier's physical being is amply cared for by two or three hours of military drill a day, two hours in athletics, plenty of wholesome food, a full night's rest and adequate medical supervision.

We have but to watch the soldier as he strides along the street with buoyant steps, head erect, shoulders carried with proud assurance, to feel that he has "cornered the health market."

Next, the mental training the soldier receives is to be considered. A soldier is not commonly supposed to be a highly educated man. But the basis on which the army is organized insures an education for him in elementary school, high school or university subjects, as the individual may require. The officers have rigid enough discipline to govern any carelessness in morals. But the traditions of the army are, perhaps, the mightiest factor in a soldier's moral growth. Could any soldier blench the name of the army in any way, when it has been hallowed by the unquenchable ardor of our soldiers in the late war?

Courage, sympathy, unquestioning allegiance to the right and faith in a Supreme Power are the heritage of our army.
