A special patriotic program was rendered, including the presentation of the trophy, by the Major and acceptance of the same by Prof. Holtzen, on behalf of the school.

It had been planned to hold the exercises in the Auditorium but owing to same not being entirely completed it was necessary to hold it in the assembly room of the school, which was crowded by the parents of the school children and their friends.

The cup is nineteen inches high, of sterling silver and bears the inscription:

Omaha Trade Excursion Coming

A special train of ten cars, bearing 125 prominent Omaha business men, will leave Omaha Sunday evening, May 23d for a week's trip through southern Nebraska, northeastern Colorado, and southeastern Wyoming.

The train will arrive in Red Cloud on Friday, May 28, at 2:25 p. m. and will leave at 3:25 p. m. Unless there is a local ordinance to the contrary a big siren whistle will commence blowing when the train is within two miles of town.

When the train comes to a stop the Omaha Chamber of Commerce band of 25 pieces will give a concert. In the meantime the Omaha business men will call on their friends at their various places of business. Business men are urged to stay at home at the day of the trade excursion.

There will be no difficulty in spotting a member of the trade excursion. He will have a blue arm band and a white hat, with Ak-Sar-Ben colors: green, orange and red. He will carry an umbrella in the same colors bearing his name and the name of his firm.

All of the firms represented will distribute souvenirs to their customers. In addition souvenir squawkers and balloons will be distributed from the baggage car to the children.

No business will be solicited. The excursion is merely Omaha's way of expressing a willingness to co-operate with the commercial bodies, officials and newspapers toward the advance of this territory.

The train consists of six sleepers, two diners, baggage car, and observation car.

Awarded Paving Contract

The mayor and city council met in special session Wednesday morning to consider bids for paving district No. 4, as per published notice to bidders.

The Watts Construction Co., was the only firm that entered a bid. The contract was awarded to the Watts Construction Co. The mayor and clerk were instructed to enter into contract with said firm.

The contractors are desirous of receiving gift edge bonds, in this case, in order that they may receive their cash as soon as the contract is completed. They bid \$2.83 per square yard for asphaltic concrete paving.

District No. 4 consists of 19 blocks and the streets are to be 26 feet wide.

Love and L. D. Richards, while the chosen ones on the Democratic ticket were Keith Neville, A. C. Shallenberger, D. V. Stevens and W. J. Bryan. W. E. Andrews, R. and H. S. Dungan, D., won in the struggle for congressman of the 5th District.

Atty. L. H. Blackledge, candidate for district judge, carried this county by a large majority and took second place in the district.
