

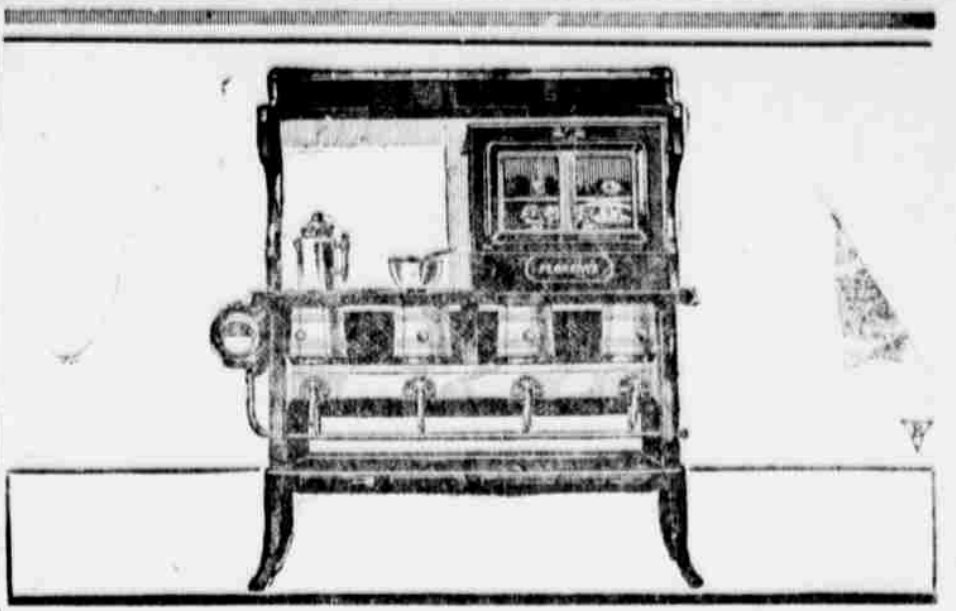

**Pure Bred Live Stock in Webster County**  
Webster county is fast coming into the front ranks as the leading Live Stock center of the state. During the past few months, 150 head of cattle and hogs have been put through the sale ring at better than \$50,000.90 per cent of this stock stayed in the county. Some as foundation stock for new herds, and some as additions to herds, already established.

**Mayor Amack Delivers His Inaugural Address**  
It is to be hoped that the following appeal of the Mayor for the people's co-operation in all things pertaining to the city's advancement will be answered and that the community in general will unite with him and the council in an effort to make Red Cloud the cleanest, best lived and most up to date city of its size in the state. Lack of civic pride, in the past, has prevailed among our citizens. With the beginning of a new civic year let us get out of this careless habit. Let each and every one do his or her part towards the beautifying of our little city.  
"Gentlemen of the City Council:—  
"We are about to enter a new year in the history of our city and upon you will depend in a very large measure the success or failure of this year's business. At the very outset let us strive to act in harmony, let each state his position on any question frankly and freely and let us all give to the others the right of individual opinion. We will undoubtedly have enough to do if we meet the objections and bickerings of our fellow townsmen, therefore let us not fight each other but act as a unit in promoting the welfare of our city.  
"Let us attempt to have the city ordinances cheerfully and promptly obeyed, not by the iron hand of the law but by arousing a genuine civic pride, using persuasion rather than force. Let us call the public's attention to the various laws before the need of enforcement arrives.  
"The new auditorium which has just been completed will bring many strangers to our city and it is highly important that we keep the weeds well in hand throughout the entire season and later on we will need to see that the sidewalks are cleared of snow. Let us start at once to enlist the help and co-operation of all our citizens to keep our city beautiful. We cannot make this city the largest in the state in one short year but we can make it the cleanest.  
"With the elimination of all strife and the establishment of harmony and good will towards each other we can perform the duties of our positions with pleasure and profit and I assure you that I will need the counsel and advice of all of you, perhaps very frequently, and I trust that this will be given without reserve and that we may act as one in all our undertakings."
